Proof of this is that on the occasion of the 97th Annual Banquet and Ball of the City Swiss Club in November of last year (reported in the December issue) just over two hundred and fifty members and friends attended; barely a month later, on 12th December, nearly one hundred and fifty members and guests were present at the Annual Christmas Dinner of the Club at the Dorchester Hotel. On this occasion there was no need to engage a toastmaster to announce the names of the members present, as is done at the banquets of the Club; almost everyone knew each other. Again, as at the last banquet, a good many of the older members were in attendance, and the younger generation was equally well represented.

During cocktails a real Christmas *Stimmung* could be felt, and when it was announced that dinner was to be served, everyone entered the Orchid Room full of pleasant anticipation. This suite, which has seen so many of the Club's dinners in the past, achieved a "new look"; it has changed its colour from pink to pale blue. There was no need to have any Christmas decorations as the room in its additional finery looked festive enough.

It goes without saying, that the principal fare at a Christmas dinner consists, of course, of turkey, Christmas pudding, mince pies, etc., and the company thoroughly enjoyed these, and other delicacies.

On coffee being served, the president, Mr. Th. von Speyr, proposed the usual toasts to H.M. the Queen and "La Suisse". He also voiced his pleasure at seeing such a large attendance, expressing the hope that some of the other meetings of the Club would be better attended. He extended a hearty welcome to Mr. B. Frick, Swiss Consul in Scotland, who has many friends amongst the members of the Club. There were four new members elected. The official part being closed, our old friend, Mr. A. Gandon, and his companions entertained the company by playing various Swiss songs on their accordions, in which everybody lustily joined. There was a humorous "Schnitzelbank" by Mr. J. Heimerdinger, an address in French by the late Mr. A. Renou, and the relating of stories by some of the members, nearly all drawing-room ones.

Before leaving the Dorchester Hotel, Mr. von Speyr wished the members and their families a Happy Christmas and a Prosperous New Year. He also thanked Mr. G. A. Ronus — who unfortunately was unable to be present — for the always generous hospitality the Hotel management extends to the Club.

Everyone departed from Park Lane in joyful spirit, having spent a gay and happy evening in congenial company.

SCHWEIZERBUND CHRISTMAS DINNER

Some forty members and friends of the "Schweizerbund" met at the Montana Hotel on Monday night, 10th December. The Club, which had had to quit its premises in Charlotte Street, has been kept going, largely due to the active President, Mr. V. Berti, and the enterprising Honorary Secretary, Mr. J. Schmid, not to forget the jovial Honorary Treasurer, Mr. R. Asch. It was an excellent idea to have a "Fondue Bourignonne" at the pre-Christmas gathering, and it was a happy crowd who sat round the half-score of spirit heaters on which the copper pans stood full of sizzling oil. The food and wine were excellent, including the Kirsch kindly donated by Montana's Manager, Mr. Bonvin.
