MARCEL LEUBA †.

Born in La Chaux-de-Fonds in 1898, our lamented friend had a boisterous youth which gave anxious moments to his parents. He was apprenticed to his father's watch case factory and in no time displayed his talents as an accomplished craftsman, a gift which he shared in no small measure with other members of his family.

He became a pioneer of the watch case industry in this country when a modest factory was established with his father, uncle and brother in Holborn in 1922.

Later he was a founder of British Watch Cases Ltd., now a member of the Melbray Group of Companies, one of the most important producer of gold watch cases in the U.K.

He was a faithful and generous friend, an endearing "boss" whose passing is mourned by all and not least by those who are still "at it" today and to whom he gave their first job forty years ago.

In 1942 he joined the City Swiss Club and, in masonic circles: The Helvetica Lodge, the Entente Cordiale and Chapter "La France". The reasonable age of 50 having been reached and passed he was blessed once, twice, thrice: a wife, a son, another son, and now a wonderful life began. Ceaselessly he worked and schemed, planning, drafting, building, aiming high; for his family the best was hardly good enough.

And now came the decline as illness crept in. Seeking temporary relief from the vagaries of the English weather, he returned to the Canary Islands and, still building, found eternal rest.

On his wedding day I said, quoting Ecclesiastes "There is a time for everything in life, now is the time for loving . . ." alas now I must say "There is a time for dying". May his soul rest in peace. *J.H.*

At the end of September, Mr. M. A. Rothlisberger retired after forty-one years with the Ionian Bank Ltd., 64 Coleman Street, London E.C.2. Mr. Rothlisberger was born in London, but brought up in Switzerland from the age of three. He went to school at Aubonne in the Canton of Vaud, and after his apprenticeship and six years of employment, both with the Union Bank of Switzerland, he came to London. A year after taking up employment with the Ionian Bank, he was sent to Greece, but returned to London in 1928. In 1950, Mr. Rothlisberger was appointed Accountant, seven years later Assistant Manager and in May 1960 Manager.

Mr. Rothlisberger is a member of several Swiss Societies especially the Nouvelle Société Helvétique and the Swiss Mercantile Society. But above all, he has devoted much time and effort to the Swiss Benevolent Society whose Assistant Treasurer he became in 1932 and Hon. Treasurer in 1938. In 1961, he was elected Vice-President, an office he still holds with distinction.

The many friends of Maurice and Helen Rothlisberger wish them a good many years of happy retirement.

As in previous years, the Youth Service of the NSH Secretariat for the Swiss Abroad, Alpenstrasse 26, 3000 Berne, are organising two Ski Camps for young compatriots living abroad. The first takes place from 27th December to 5th January at Marmorera in the Grisons, and the second from 28th February to 9th March on the Riederalp in the Valais. Participants will be allocated to various groups according to their ski-ing abilities and will be given expert instruction. The evenings will be devoted to lectures, film shows, music and discussions. Please apply immediately to Berne, as the number of participants is limited. Cost: Fr.110.—, not including travelling and ski lifts. In certain circumstances, a reduction may be granted.

SPECIAL SWITZERLAND/U.K. CHRISTMAS FARES

Over Christmas and New Year, Swissair is again offering special excursion return fares for travel between Switzerland and the U.K. by day flights. They are available only for journeys starting in Switzerland, for flights to the U.K. between 21st and 30th December 1965, returning between 31st December 1965 and 9th January 1966. Tourist return to London costs Frs.345.— (£28 5s. 0d.) from Zurich and Frs. 325.— (£26 13s. 0d.) from Basle or Geneva. First class return fares are Frs.440.— (£36 1s. 0d.) and Frs.420.— (£34 8s. 0d.) respectively.

The validity of these special fares is 15 days, including day of journey to the U.K. They are not available as one-way fares. Payment can be made in Switzerland or the U.K., but not in other countries.
