On Thursday, 12th May, members and friends of the Swiss Club Manchester had the pleasure of welcoming Madame Geneviève Davidson of the Universities of Geneva and Liverpool, who gave a talk on the Swiss writer Friedrich Dürrenmatt.

In the past we have heard Madame Davidson talk on a number of subjects, for example, "Lost Valleys", Ramuz and Zermatt, and therefore we looked forward with great interest to listening to her again.

In 1960, Liverpool University conferred the honorary degree of Master of Arts on Madame Davidson, who had then been thirty years President of the Liverpool French Society, now *Membre d'Honneur*, for a number of years Vice-President of Liverpool Italian Literary Society, fifteen years President of the Liverpool Swiss Ladies Club, also President of the Relief Society, and is still very active in other fields.

After an excellent meal in the Grill Room of the Midland Hotel, our little group of faithfuls were joined by several other members and friends to listen to a most interesting and lively talk. Madame Davidson was able to give us a clear and true picture of this very controversial writer, and awaken in us an interest and understanding for this exceptionally gifted author. May I mention here just a few of his works, novels, short stories and plays, so well explained to us:— "The Physicists", "The Promise", "Der Meteor", "Es ist Geschrieben", "Der Blinde", "Romulus", "An Angel Comes To Babylon".

Dürrenmatt, in his younger years, called his works "Brot — Literatur" because evidently at the beginning he must have known the hard sides of life before emerging as one of the great and best known contemporary writers in our country.

Madame Davidson, after her excellent talk, was warmly applauded by everybody present, and we expressed to her our sincere wish to meet her again soon.

THREE LANGUAGES AND ONE CHURCH

On Sunday, 22nd May, the "Eglise Suisse de Londres" and the "Schweizerkirche" held a Communal Church Assembly. The morning service was attended by members of both parishes, including even whole families and visitors from Switzerland. Monsieur le Pasteur Nicod and Herr Pfarrer Dietler centred their preaching on the spiritual calling of our disseminated community. Happy contacts were made during lunch in the Church Hall, when loyal old parishioners of thirty and more years' residence mixed with young boys and girls who were only just beginning to realise what the Swiss Church really means.

At the Assembly, the Pastors reported on the activities which the Church runs to meet its diverse needs, principal amongst these being the visiting of residents in the Greater London area and the Provinces; this ministry is now being practised actively by lay people. The moral, spiritual and practical needs of the young Swiss in London is another vitally important part of the work.

In the name of the "Consistoire", Mr. Bader spoke of the activities developed to solve the building problems of the two congregations, and after a brief discussion, Monsieur Tosio explained the aims and needs of the "Forum of Switzerland" at the Swiss Centre in Leicester Square.

This Church Assembly showed the vast spiritual responsibility of the Swiss Church in London, and one of Mr. Dietler's remarks may well summarise the day: "We have to carry out a fight on several fronts, but where is the Army?".
