With its 2,400 exhibitors representing agriculture, industry and craftwork, this great traditional market, which is attended by over a million visitors each year, is the country's largest and most popular autumn economic event. Other countries, too, show great interest in the Lausanne Fair owing first of all to the overall picture it gives of Swiss production, the interesting light it throws on customs and traditions of Switzerland and her people, and secondly to its liberal attitude in opening its pavilions of honour to two official foreign guests — this year, Spain and the Ivory Coast Republic.

A wonderful view over the Glacier Valley can be enjoyed from the cableway's mountain station. In the village a newly opened little museum, near the church, houses a comprehensive exhibition of traditional Alpine village life. . .
