He travelled for this chemical concern and came to Great Britain in 1963, accompanied by his wife and two boys. He took up work with Geigy (U.K.) Ltd., and is now settled in Great Britain. He says he likes the country, its institutions and its pubs.

Living at Bowdon in Cheshire, he takes a keen interest in the affairs of the Swiss community in Manchester and surrounding districts and is now tackling the job of President with vigour and interest. We wish him a happy and successful term of office.

NEW SWISSAIR MANAGER FOR NORTH OF ENGLAND

It covers the varied activities on behalf of the Swiss abroad, especially during the "Year of Fifth Switzerland" culminating in the acceptance of the special Constitutional Article for the Swiss Abroad. Amongst other activities are the "Echo" (periodical for the Swiss abroad), film and youth services, training facilities for young *Auslandsschweizer*, Swiss schools abroad and Solidarity Fund.

Also free of charge may be had the brochure "**Die Fünfte Schweiz**" in either German, French or Italian.
