SWISS WOMEN ARE "MEETING THE BRITISH"

The many passers-by hurrying or ambling along London's Leicester Square in the evening of Wednesday, 25th October, must have been surprised to see a fast-moving newscaster throwing a welcome in huge, bright lettering to Swiss women who had come to "meet the British", and what's more, to see the welcome also in genuine "Schwyzertütsch". The Swiss visitors, on the last day before their return home, were received at the Swiss Centre by the Management of Swiss Fair Ltd., Swissair, Swiss National Tourist Office and Anglo-Continental Travel. They were introduced to the Centre so as to give them an idea of the latest addition to the activities of the Swiss community in Great Britain, or more especially in London.

But the purpose of the visit of the Swiss visitors, 40 women and one husband who acted as photographer, was to see something of the British way of life. For several years, a scheme has been in operation giving British women an opportunity of "meeting the Swiss" in Switzerland. By now, several hundred members, mainly of the Townswomen's Guilds, go over every year, and their courses are centred at Duerrenaesche in the off-season, when the Home for the Swiss Abroad is not used by *Auslandschweizer*.

The pilot tour "the other way round" took place from 16th to 26th October, and participants came from many parts of Switzerland, being members of various women's organisations. Experiences and findings will be evaluated and made use of in further excursions in spring and autumn next year.

Travel was by Swissair and in this country by coach. It began at Worthing and sightseeing in Brighton, Bournemouth, the New Forest. At the Anglo-Continental School in Bournemouth, a number of lectures and talks were provided by German-speaking Englishmen; there were visits to private families, to a school, a hospital, a meeting in Bournemouth of the Townswomen's Guild; there was a film show and a civic reception, a visit to a Stately Home and Southampton, to a farm and to Windsor Castle. The last 24 hours were spent in London where members of the Townswomen's Guild took the Swiss visitors shopping after a sightseeing tour.

It was at the end of the visit when the Editor met the ladies from Switzerland, and there was nothing but praise. If there was any criticism at all, it was that more time should have been available for the comprehensive programme. But no doubt, such exchanges are most valuable and are the best contribution to "getting to know you" in an integrated Europe.
