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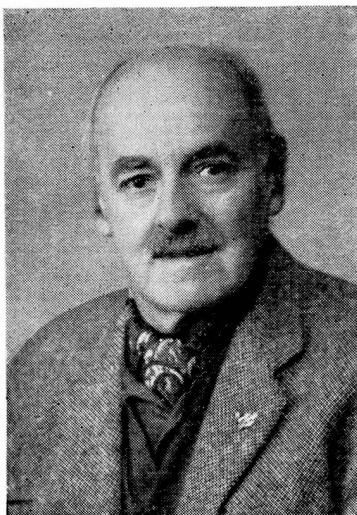
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**JOSEPH CHRISTEN 80**

It is with great pleasure that we inform our readers of the 80th birthday of Mr. Joseph (Joe) Christen, "Rigiblick", Oberwil/Zug, formerly of London.

He was born at Wolfenschiessen (Nidwalden) and received his schooling in Zug. At an early age, he indulged in ski-ing, and readers may remember his amusing account published some time ago in the S.O. He became a ski-ing instructor as early as 1907. He combined his sporting career with that of assistant chef at the Grand Hotel Schoenfels, Zugerberg. He was later appointed instructor by the Zurich sports firm of Fritsch & Co. He won many competitions.

In 1913, he came to London for a short period, as he wanted to return to Gstaad as ski-ing instructor. His plans were thwarted by the war, as he had to join his Regiment. In 1916 he was released from Army life and he returned to London. He exchanged ski-ing for managing the New Corn Exchange Restaurant in Mark Lane in the City, and then he became Steward at the "Schweizerbund" (Swiss Club) Restaurant in Charlotte Street. After six years, in 1928, he was elected President of the Club and President of the Swiss Gymnastic Society, being keen on gym and other sports.

Whilst his wife managed a boarding house, he joined a commercial concern under the management of Mr. R. W. Dreyfus, and in a short time became foreman. In 1941, his house in Charlotte Street was totally destroyed in a bombing raid. His wife and seven other people were killed, whilst he was buried under the burning rubble. He was rescued eventually, badly injured. After many months of suffering, Mr. Christen was able to walk again, and his former employer, Mr. Dreyfus, gave him a home until he had fully recovered. Again thanks to his benefactor, he was offered a job as caretaker with Heddon Smith's, a position he still occupied when his 70th birthday was written up in the columns of this paper.

A few years ago, Mr. Christen retired to the Canton of Zug. He had a promising career spoilt twice and suffered great misfortunes. But he bore them with courage and fortitude, and we hope that he will enjoy many more years of good health and wellbeing. His nephew, Stadtrat Sidler, Zug, tells us that he still reads the "Swiss Observer" from cover to cover and wishes to be remembered to any of his old friends who may still be here.
