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OBITUARY

We deeply regret the death of Lady Louise Howard, of 14 Blackheath Park, S.E.3. She was the widow of Sir Albert Howard, C.I.E., whom she married as his second wife in 1931. She was formerly a fellow of Newnham College, Cambridge, and head of the agricultural section of the International Labour Office. Her interest in Switzerland has always been very keen, and she had many connections. She was in her 89th year.

It is with deep regret that we announce the death of Mr. J. J. Huber, of "Pine Stoep", 1 Oakroyd Avenue, Potters Bar, Middx. He died on 3rd February, at the age of 76. Mr. Huber came to this country in 1913 from Huettlingen and, after a spell in Africa and Paris, finally settled here in 1926. At that time, he represented the Swiss Photographic Company Typon S.A., Burgdorf. the early 'thirties he founded his own company J. J. Huber Ltd., which is today widely known in the graphic arts field as specialists in photolitho equipment and materials. Mr. Huber retired some 12 years ago, but kept a constant and enthusiastic interest in the business he had founded. He joined the Swiss Mercantile Society in 1927. We extend our sincere sympathy to his family.

We deeply regret the death on 4th February of Mr. Hugo Schwander, of 3 Zihlstrasse, Nidau (Berne). He came to this country just before the first world war, a citizen of Bueren a/Aare. From 1929 until his retirement in 1954, he was with the City firm of sugar brokers, Czarnikows. A year later he retired to Basle where he stayed until last year, when he moved to Nidau, to the very house in which he was born 79 years ago. His family had been old-established citizens, and his father and mother lived to the age of 98 and 96 respectively.

Whilst in London, Mr. Schwander was a keen supporter of the Swiss Mercantile Society of which he had already been a member in Switzerland. He was awarded the Veterans' Wappenscheibe for 50 years of membership in 1964. For many years he was a member of the Swiss Choral Society. He was also a Past Master of the Helvetica

Lodge.

In the very first bombing raid on London in August 1940, he was bombed out of his house in Purley, and he and his wife had a miraculous escape. He was an ardent gardener and received many prizes for his allotment. In Basle, too, he cultivated a Schrebergarten, and when he moved to Nidau, he not only took pride in the large garden, but also an orchard.

Hugo Schwander was a man of great integrity and a very straightforward nature. He will be missed by many friends, and we extend our sincere sympathy to his wife

and family.

WELCOME TO NEW COUNSELLOR OF EMBASSY

We have great pleasure in welcoming the new First Counsellor of Embassy, Monsieur Juerg A. Iselin, successor to Monsieur J. D. Grandjean, now Ambassador in Algiers. Dr. Iselin was born in 1920 and educated in Basle, where he completed his studies at the University with a doctorate in law in 1944. He joined the Federal Political Department at the beginning of the following year dealing with financial and economic questions. From 1950 to 1953, he was in India (Swiss Legation, Delhi) and then returned to the Division of Political Affairs at the DFP in Berne. He was in charge of relations with U.S.A. and also Secretary of the Commission for Nationalisation Compensation Appeals. His next assignment was Deputy to the Permanent Observer for Switzerland at the United Nations in New York (1956 to 1959). Next, he was appointed to the Swiss Embassy in Cologne/Bonn and became Counsellor for Economic Affairs in 1961. Dr. Iselin joined the Integration Bureau of the Federal Political and Economic Department in 1953. He was Head of the Bureau from September 1966 until the middle of February last when he came to London.

Monsieur Iselin is married and has one daughter, aged 17. She will finish her schooling in Switzerland in September, when she and her mother will come to London. We wish Dr. Iselin a successful career in this country and extend best wishes for a happy stay to him and Madame Iselin.

On Dr. Iselin's arrival, we had to take leave of Monsieur Gaspard Bodmer who has been at the Embassy since September 1964. He was born in Zurich in 1931, studied in Geneva, Paris and at Yale University. He joined the Federal Political Department in 1956. He then went to the Swiss Embassy in Cologne and was later attached to the Swiss delegation to OECD in Paris and to the Swiss Embassy in the Hague.

In London, Monsieur Bodmer was in charge of Press matters and acted as First Counsellor ad interim after Monsieur Grandjean's departure. He has left London for new duties in Berne, and the many friends he leaves behind wish him success and happiness for the future.
