ceuticals plant was located.

The weather was misty and dreary. It was hard to appreciate the beauty of the Manchester surroundings. We passed in front of the toxicology division, a converted mansion in which toxicological tests on products are carried out on behalf of the company's pharmaceuticals and agricultural chemicals divisions the road winds up Edge Hill, a famed beauty spot overlooking the whole of the Cheshire plain. Unfortunately, low clouds prevented us from having any view and a blanket of snow gave a bleak aspect to the landscape.

We arrived at the Pharmaceuticals Division, probably the most modern and functional plant in the Northern Midlands. ICI Pharmaceuticals are only three hundred yards away but the plant although modern as well, appeared less attractive due to a difference in architectural concept. The Geigy plant is all glass and concrete and designed with Swiss ideas. The leading architect came from Basle. British minds also contributed to the erection of the ultra-modern plant which received a Civic Trust Award in 1965 and 1968. The estate has three spaced-out buildings: a gleaming administrative block, a glass-panelled refectory and the production building. 560 people are employed at the Hurdfield Estate.

Time was running short and we had to turn back towards Manchester. The small glimpse I had of Geigy U.K. was enough to convince me of the strength of Swiss capital in this country. (PMB)

We regret to announce the passing away on February 25th of Mr. Erwin Fankhauser at the age of 84. He had been ill for two or three years.
