"DANGERS FACING SWITZERLAND FROM WITHIN AND FROM OUTSIDE"

Forthcoming Open Meeting of the Nouvelle Société Helvétique

All Swiss and their friends are invited to hear a lecture by Dr. Albert Hunold, on "Dangers facing Switzerland from within and from outside". It will be given (in English) on Thursday, 20th May, at 7.45 p.m. at the

Swiss Hostel for Girls, 9 Belsize Grove, N.W.3.

Dr. Hunold is a distinguished writer and lecturer of repute, having given many lecture tours in several countries, a number of them in the USA, once as a Rockefeller Fellow. He studied in Zurich, Geneva and at London University and London School of Economics. Having taken degrees in natural sciences and mathematics, as well as in economics, Dr. Hunold followed a successful career in banking. He was also Delegate of the Swiss Institute for Foreign Research and is President of the Wilhelm Roepke Foundation. His writings include books on "Economic Freedom as International Problem", "Swiss Labour Peace", "The Free World in the Cold War", "Freedom and Serfdom—an Anthology of Western Thought", etc. The evening promises to be extremely interesting.

NOUVELLE SOCIÉTÉ HELVÉTIQUE APRIL MEETING

Members of the London Group of the Nouvelle Société Helvétique heard the Central President of the movement, Mr. Jean Claude Nicole, speak on its meaning and prospects. His talk was in a melodious and limpid French and reverberated with hope and idealism. He spoke primarily on the future role of the NSH, and this led him to examine what the future could bring to Switzerland.

He reviewed the present political and moral state of the country. He referred to planning and environment and emphasised the importance of *Prospective*, a French term describing the science of future possibilities. Mankind, he said, was now in a position to control its own future to a greater extent. Modern man could avoid allowing his descendants to be the victims of his own mistakes if only he took the trouble of investigating the consequences of his acts and decisions. In this respect, the national vote on federal land planning of 1969 was a vital and necessary step. In the course of his exposé, Mr. Nicole came to mention many startling facts.

For example, the proportion of foreigners among the Swiss population was higher in 1914, when the NSH was founded, than it is today. But its composition was different. Nowadays the great majority of foreigners settled in Switzerland are working people; before the first world war they were a kind of elite. Another interesting fact mentioned by Mr. Nicole was the influence of communal belonging in polling attendance. A survey in Geneva had shown that 53.5 per cent of citizens hailing from the town went to the polls in a particular year, 45.5 per cent of other French-speaking Swiss and only 38.6 per cent of the German Swiss. These figures had a bearing on the development of communal democracy. Owing to the migration of population within the country, many Swiss no longer lived in their commune of origin, or indeed had never lived there. These conditions put a strain on the survival of an active local democracy.

Mr. Nicole's talk was followed by a number of questions. It was a particularly interesting evening. (PMB)
