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protestants met regularly on Sundays at 4 p.m. for prayer and bible studies. The photoclub was not yet anle to resume its activities, since the laboratory is not finished yet. It will re-open again in 1973.

Accommodation and office for the chaplain was so far ready by the middle of December, that he was able to move from his temporary accommodation. This was the hardest struggle, since the builder who was employed and had promised to finish by the end of March proved utterly unreliable and incompetent. After one of his workman had started a fire on the roof area which had done considerable damage (13th May), he lost interest which brought the work to a practical standstill. After the fact of a broken contract had finally been established he was dismissed. Mr. John Staunton, clerk of works at the Westminster Cathedral, offered his help. From 15th November until well into 1973 he worked with the chaplain and some helpers, often late into the night, undid the sloppy wotk of the previous builder and really made good what had been neglected. Some outside and inside work, a full redecoration and a new system of central heating lies still ahead but thanks to him and all the helpers the financial loss has been kept at a minimum. The building Account has not yet been closed but it is hoped that it will not be more than about 15 to 20% above the estimated cost - if no unforseen problem is encountered.

The ecumenical co-operation with the protestant communities proved a real blessing, all the social activities are now run on a ecumenical basis, the mothers group on the third Wednesday of the month, the youth club activities, and in conducting the divine service there is mutual help and assistance.

The news mazagines *Die Stimme* and *Messager* have been greatly improved. Through the Secretariat of the Swiss Abroad in Berne an amount of Fr. 5000 was received from the Swiss First of August Collection towards the cost of a printing machine. This enables us to prepare all our necessary printed matter ourselves and have it duplicated by off-set printing which reduces the cost by nearly 50%. It does mean more work, but if offers more scope. Since the information service is one of the most important tasks in our field of work, this is well worth the trouble.

All in all, one can say that the move from St. Ann's Church to the John Southworth Centre in 48 Great Peter Street has been successfully completed. It remains to find out, how far the chaplain can involve himself in the successful running of this Youth and Community Centre to the benefit of the Swiss Community in London. There is a different approach to former times when the young Swiss were more for themselves and the chaplain had his own church to look after. The year 1973 will probe the way a little bit further.

Our thanks go to His Eminence Cardinal Heenan, the Diocesan Finance Offices and the Parish of Westminster for the co-operation and help in this difficult year and for the welcome we have received at 48 Great Peter Street.

We are also very grateful to the *Schweizerische Fastenopfer* who has considerably raised its yearly contribution and has always shown a great interest in the work of the Swiss Catholic Mission in London.

We thank His Excellency the Swiss Ambassador, Mr. A. Weitnauer, and the staff of the Swiss Embassy for the interest, help and co-operation received and also the Secretariat of the Swiss Abroad in Berne for the substantial support.

A special thank to everybody who has helped me during the strenuous year 1972, the pastors of the protestant churches, Bruno Frei and all the other helpers who were always ready to work during their free time to make the move a success. Here I also include especially the untiring work rendered by our Chairman, Mr.O. Grob, and Mr. I. R. Daetwiler with all the members of the Committee who took part in all the anguish and were always ready to assist with work and advice, whenever the chaplain was in a tight corner, which happened more than once.

# **ARMIN BAENZIGER**

It is with deep regret that we announce the death of Mr. Armin Baenziger, of 4 Dulwich Wood Park, SE 19. He died on Monday, 23rd July at the age of 78. Hailing from the Canton of Appenzell, he came to this country as a very young man. He joined the well-known non-ferrous metal merchants A. Strauss & Co. to which he devoted all his working life. He advanced to Manager, then joined the board and became Managing Director. At a time when he might have thought of retiring he had to work even harder, for the untimely death of one of his co-dorectors Mr. Walter Meier left a serious gap. But with great energy and sense of duty he continued to direct the company until his retirement a few years ago. He was a shrewd business man of few words and with the wit and humour of his countrymen from the Appenzell. His knowledge of the non-ferrous metal trade was unequalled, and he was much respected in the City.

Mr. Baenziger joined the Swiss Mercantile Society in 1921 and he was a generous supporter of the Swiss Benevolent Society, the Swiss Observer and the Swiss Church.

## THE DISTRESSING SACRIFICE TO MATERIAL THINGS

A reader from London, Mrs. E. Tober, has sent us the following comment following our rather severe appreciation of two of the films shown during the recent Swiss fortnight at the National Film Theatre.

I was surprised to read in your last but one issue your article about the Swiss film season at the NFT. Surely, there was no need to express your dislike of Soutter's Les Arpenteurs n such strong terms. This and the other film were, after all, outside the usual run of films today – no display of copulation and no violence! You may not have liked them but it could have occurred to you that they might have appealed to some people.

I went to see two of the sessions. I admit the audience was sparse and many of them did walk out before the end. Such is the taste of today's public. I, however, as well as my English husband and teenage son, enjoyed the films very much. And for once I felt proud of my countrymen. Here are young people who have the courage to create something which they know will not be a box-office success and not appeal to the masses.

This is certainly a rare feature for the Swiss of today who have made money their god and whose ideals aim at quantity rather than at the quality of life. The materialism which exists today in Switzerland is indeed frightening. They sacrifice everything for money - more production, bigger exports, bigger profits, larger and more roads, heavier lorries, more cars, more foreign workers, etc., to achieve it. And the results are hidden by 'clever' politicians and greedy capitalists!

results in overpopulation This leading to shortages of essentials such as water and electricity, over building on a restricted countryside, property speculation, pollution of lakes, rivers and the atmosphere, cutting down of forests, demolition of old buildings, overcrowding in schools and a breakdown of essential services such as the postal service and the hotel industry.

In short, a deterioration of the quality of life and an ecological breakdown!

Maybe this is why Mr. Tanner and Mr. Soutter could not show us the traditional images of Switzerland (as P.M.B. no dount would have liked it) with its sparkling lakes and rivers, its quiet mountains and pretty villages. They are no more to be found! . . . As for the film portraying the boredom of a Swiss family, it is not only true for the Swiss, but for millions of families all over the "western world - because the "luxuries" we have "gained" cannot replace the things we have lost!
