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
in the same industrial group, offers a wide choice of styles in a somewhat lower price-range starting from £13.75. Right at the opposite end, Audemars Piguet sell their watches from £400 to £30,000 for the more elaborate diamond set models made to individual requirements. It is interesting to note that these watches sell particularly well in Japan, where their fine craftsmanship is highly prized in a country renowned for its success in mass production. Audemars Piguet limit their production to fewer than 7,000 watches a year. Those that are available to order from the top jewellers in the UK include the thinnest man's wristwatch in the world, selling at £690, and another with minute repeater and a perpetual calender taking account of leap years, costing £15,000. An 18 ct. white gold

diamond-set pocket watch with visible skeleton movement sells for $\pounds 5,300$.

SCHWEIZERBUND

The distance hardly seemed to have discouraged members of the Schweizerbund for its last dinner, which was held on Friday, 6th September, at the Old Palace, Hatfield Park. A larger than usual attendance enjoyed an excellent meal in a remarkable Elizabethan setting. For £3 inclusive of all other charges, they were offered a feast whose centre-piece was an abundant helping of fillet of pork Wellington with assorted vegetables in season. Strawberries Romanoff, cheese and coffee completed one of the best meals we had enjoyed for a very long time at a Swiss function.

The explanation for this very high value for money probably lies in the fact that it is cheaper to cater in Hertfordshire than it is in the heart of London. This prolonged and generous meal didn't apparently leave much energy for the guests to sing at the end, but some token singing was carried out all the same, to keep up with tradition. The 30–40 members present sang the three most popular Swiss songs contained in the song brochure supplied to them by Mr. Juerg Schmidt, secretary of the club, by courtesy of the SNTO. These were "La haut sur la Montagne," "Fidiri-fidira" and "Famalipe". Like all Schweizerbund evenings, this one was as friendly and informal as usual, and prompted the



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president to announce a forthcoming function for 31st December. Certainly it was an experience to dine in an Elizabethan banqueting hall, and we thoroughly recommend the Old Palace as a venue to anyone planning a large dinner party. P.M.B.
