

THE WALDMANN YOUTH CHOIR IN LONDON

Concert at the Swiss Church

The concert given by the Waldmann Youth Choir from Zurich was a special treat. It was arranged by the Nouvelle Société Helvétique in London, in conjunction with the International Liszt Centre for 19th Century Music. It took place at the Swiss Church in Endell Street on Thursday, 17th October, and it was gratifying to see the Church full. Amongst those present were the Swiss Consul-General and Mrs Adams and the wife of the Cultural Counsellor, Dr. Birrer. As usual, a number of members of the Embassy attended. The President of the NSH, Obis Mariann Meier, welcomed the audience and the Choir.

The Choir consisted of some fifty young people between 11 and 18, and they had set out to London and Paris as a celebration of the school's centenary, the "Freie Evangelische Schule". It was under the direction of its headmaster, Dr. Peter Zutter, a musician of feeling and the ability of passing on his enthusiasm to the youngsters. They sang the whole demanding programme without notes, quite an achievement, for it included songs in several languages. Right to the end it was obvious that they sang with real joy, completely free from inhibition, and although towards the end, a little fatigue became noticeable in their voices, they gave a most creditable performance, ably assisted by two violins and a cello, and above all by a competent pianist, Brigitte Schnyder, and the solo singers Rosetta Zutter and Beatrice Lienert. Brigitte Schnyder also showed her musical skill as a soloist. The young flautist Barbara Jetzer gave an excellent and very sensitive performance on the recorder, having had bad luck in

damaging her flute shortly before the concert.

The programme was most varied, beginning with church music by Hammerschmidt ("Herzlich lieb hab ich dich, Herr") and Staden's Cantate Domino Motette. Then followed De Fesch's Sonata in B flat major for flute and piano.

Michael Haydn's Kyrie gave the young singers much scope to show their skill, and it was performed most impressively. Two compositions by Mozart (Sub tuum praesidium and his Andante in C major for flute and piano) followed. Dvorak's "Trost" made great demands on the Choir, but they gave of their best living up to an enthusiastic and appreciative audience. Three songs, Werner's "Heidenröslein", Brahms' "In stiller Nacht" and Mendelssohn's "Maiglöckchen und die Blümelein" ended the first part of the concert.

The second half was devoted to Swiss composers. To a London audience, this meant hearing works rarely, if ever, performed in Britain, whilst to Swiss nationals present it also brought greetings from their homeland, tinged with a touch of nostalgia.

Bachofen's "Viele verachten die edele Musik" and three songs by Schoeck came first. The latter proved at times rather difficult for the young singers, but they sustained a reasonably high standard throughout. Mueller's "Four Miniatures for Piano" followed. Next came Klug's "Zuspruch" (1974), a small Cantata for choir and instruments.

The last part of the programme was given over to songs in Swiss, German, Italian, Romanch and French, and here the young voices sang with spirited abandon and joy.

On the whole it was a splendid evening, and the Choir and soloists, accompanists and conductor well deserved the eager applause the audience accorded them.
