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LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Sir.

A recent article about the Swiss abroad in the Swiss Observer struck a note of sadness for me.

My parents, both from Zürich, came to England in 1912, my Father, Frederick M. Gamper, returning to Switzerland for a brief spell to join-up at the outbreak of World War I.

They retained their Swiss nationality and close ties with the Swiss Colony. For many years my Father played a prominent part in the activities of the Swiss Benevolent Society, being Hon. Treasurer for six years and later Vice-President. He was also President of the "Swiss Home" and founder-member of the Helvetica Lodge

When World War II seemed imminent my Father unselfishly became a naturalised British subject to enable his sons to become officers in the British forces. As there was no dual nationality in those days this meant relinquishing Swiss nationality.

It was only after serving five years as a pilot in the RAF – during which time I became of age - that I realised the full implications. Sadly my national ties with Switzerland, which have been traced back to Wolfgang Gamper from Leon, Canton Aargan 1527, had been severed.

I married a Swiss lady, so our children, from a blood point of view, are 100 per cent solid Swiss stock! I find it sad that because dual nationality did not exist prior to the war, I and my sons' claim to Swiss nationality has been irrevocably lost.

This letter from Mr. Gamper will doubtless strike a chord of sadness in many of us. Unfortunately, the Swiss Embassy in London has confirmed that, under existing legislation, Mr. Gamper and his offspring are not entitled to Swiss nationality. He is, however, advised not to give up hope completely. Changes to our nationality laws are constantly under review, so he would be well-advised to keep a watchful eye on the Swiss Press and, of course, this paper. We thank him for taking the trouble to write to us and extend him our most fraternal greetings. Editor
