## Advent concert and Christmas get-together

Two artists not unknown in the Swiss community gave a pre-Christmas Concert at the Swiss Church in Endell Street on Thursday, 16th December. **Ian Mitchell** (clarinet) and **Lennart Rabes** (piano) were welcomed by the NSH President, Mrs. Mariann Meier, and the artists in turn introduced the works performed. The concert opened with Grieg's Holberg Suite. This was originally composed for the piano, but today, one hears more often the transcription for orchestra by Grieg himself. Lennart Rabes played the suite with great competence and brilliance.

Next came Weber's Grand Duo Concertant, Op. 48, for clarinet and piano. The two artists played this delightful composition in excellent harmony, and the fine clarinet playing was particularly pleasing.

Mrs. Ian Mitchell then read two short poems on cats by T. S. Eliott, and

this was followed by the Cat Variations for clarinet and piano by Humphrey Searle. The audience responded with good humour and obvious enjoyment.

Lennart Rabes then played two Chopin studies in F minor and C minor, showing his great sensitivity and lyrical phrasing.

During the short intervals, the Christmas story according to St. Luke and a short prayer were given by Father Bossard and the Rev. Orna-Ornstein.

The concert ended by "Oh du Froehliche" sung by the audience accompanied on the organ.

Then followed the Christmas Get-together of the Nouvelle Société Helvétique in the beautifully decorated hall of the Church. Some 800 members and friends sat down to seasonal refreshments, and thanks were expressed to Mrs. Meier for making such excellent arrangements.
