Having a Swiss wife and connections, I am interested in all things Swiss. I note in the February issue of the Swiss Observer a letter from Mr. Ernest Bader on conscientious objection to fighting. Probably 99 per cent of people consider war futile. General Guisan in the last war made it clear to the Germans that the Swiss would resist an incursion into their territory. It is more than probable, but for this, the Germans would have come. What would have happened if there had been then wholesale desertions?

Your correspondent perhaps might say "Better let them in and avoid bloodshed." But would it? What about further gas chambers for the Jews and regimentation of the Swiss for further German aggression.
