

Reflections on the 55th Assembly of the Swiss Abroad in Lausanne from 19th to 21st August 1977

Apart from the plenary session which took place at the «Théâtre Municipal» on 20th August in the presence of Federal Councillor Georges-André Chevallaz, the Organization of the Swiss Abroad had convened meetings of the Commission on Information, of the Co-ordinating Commission on Information, of the Solidarity Fund as well as the Association of Friends of the Organisation of the Swiss Abroad – meetings in which Swiss participants from abroad show lively interest in their umbrella organization year after year.

The Commission of the Swiss Abroad, chaired by the former Councillor of States Dr. Louis Guisan, gathered in the Chamber of the Vaudois Grand Council for its ordinary meeting. It would be boring to enumerate all the matters treated. Suffice it that the delegates took note with great interest of new regulations in the field of social welfare, amongst them the 9th revision of the OAI/DI at present subject to a Referendum. We shall come back to this at the right time. The nationality of children of Swiss mothers abroad married to foreigners gave rise to a satisfactory exchange of views, and a mandate was given to the special committee to carry on its work. One should mention, too, the unemployment insurance for Swiss abroad returning to Switzerland and for borderers, as well as the law concerning foreigners in Switzerland and the evacuation of Swiss residents in countries with political unrest. A topical subject, technical development aid, was the main theme

of the 55th Assembly. It was not the aim to define Helvetic policy in this field, but on the contrary to demonstrate concrete aspects and achievements by Swiss abroad who have become residents in various parts of the world.

After an introduction by the President of the Organization of the Swiss Abroad and a message from the Central Committee of the Nouvelle Société Helvétique given by Me Michel Renaud, President of the Lausanne Group of the NSH, we had the pleasure of hearing Mr Jean-René Bory, President of the Foundation for the History of the Swiss Abroad. An inspiring speaker who captivated our attention by telling us of technical development in the past and of the manner Swiss went abroad to collect ideas which they

put to good use on returning home, whilst today we try to use our own ideas for the benefit of other countries. Mr Marcel Ney, Director of the Secretariat of the Swiss Abroad, introduced in a humorous way the relationship existing between the Swiss abroad and technical development. Subsequently, he chaired a round table discussion of compatriots abroad who told us of their experiences. We heard the following speakers:

- Mr A. Scherer, agronomist, Puerto Esperanza, Argentina
- Miss Christa Buerghi, laboratory assistant, near Pondichéry, India
- Mr J. A. Marendaz, arboriculturist, formerly in Pakistan
- Mrs E. Preiswerk, teacher, Tabora, Tanzania
- Mr H.-R. Schuerch, representative of a Swiss firm, recently in Singapore, Indonesia and Japan.

After a film on the alphabetisation in Bénin, the Delegate for Technical Co-operation, Monsieur l'Ambassadeur Marcel Heimo gave a survey of projects in the course of being realized and those being prepared in his Department. He showed the difficulties, but also the need for such an undertaking. It was followed by a report by Mr Rudolf Högger, head of the section Evaluation of Technical Co-operation. It was illustrated by interesting slides.

Monsieur le Ministre Jaccard, in charge of the Service for the Swiss Abroad at the Federal Political Department, gave a short sum-

many of the problems facing the Swiss abroad at the moment. Federal Councillor Georges-André Chevallaz, Minister of Finance and Customs, gave a detailed talk on Swiss politics, including the attitude of the Swiss people towards technical aid to developing countries.

We should not like to omit our thanks to all those who contributed towards the success of the 55th Assembly, notably the Commune of Lausanne und its Mayor, Monsieur Jean-Pascal Delamuraz, who honoured us by addressing the gathering at the official opening, and also the President of the Vaudois Council of State, Monsieur Marc-Henri Ravussin. In a previous issue of this periodical, you had a chance of admiring the caricatures of these personalities, made by the artist André Paul.

The Swiss abroad may be considered very good ambassadeurs, may be even too good for helvetic realities. This implies on one hand that the Swiss people take note of their activities, which may and should go as far as recognition. On the other hand, it means that the Swiss have to justify the good image which the Swiss abroad have created of Switzerland, an image incidentally which has been marked by a number of plebiscite decisions.

Social events of great variety allowed everybody to experience a typically helvetic atmosphere and above all to make valuable contacts. On Saturday evening, we danced at the Abbey of Montheron, and the singer Michel Bühler, a true Vaudois as his name tells! entertained an appreciative audience. On the following day, we had the pleasure of visiting Chillon Castle.

The Congress of 1977 is past – long live the Congress of 1978 which will take place at Einsiedeln/Schwyz from 25th to 27th August. We shall be happy to welcome you there, too.

«Schweizer Uniformen / Uniformes suisses 1700-1850»

tariat in Berne, and the Committee for Swiss Schools Abroad benefited.

In order that the Secretariat of the Swiss Abroad can continue and possibly enlarge its manyfold activities – either in the field of care, information and contact promotion, or in its youth service –, it is dependent now as ever on the support of the Swiss National Day Collection. This even more so, since the economy measures of the Confederation meant a drop in the federal subsidy towards the work of the Organization of the Swiss Abroad. In addition, the Swiss abroad are specially exposed in their countries of residence in recession and coercive measures campaigns. The Committee for Swiss Schools Abroad, too, still depends on financial support for the tasks entrusted to it by the respective federal law which came into force on 1st January 1976. Financial aid to school equipment, libraries etc. should be mentioned; considerable urgent improvements in this direction are indicated.

The Swiss National Day Fund is convinced that the collection earmarked for the Swiss abroad will be accepted favourably by the Swiss people, and it invites the Swiss abroad to support the campaign 1978 energetically by buying the National Day badges.



Swiss National Day Collection 1978 for the Swiss Abroad

Every first of August, the Swiss people celebrate the anniversary of the foundation of the Confederation. Nearly 700 years ago, the first confederates united and decided to assist one another in adversity and danger. With this act of solidarity, they achieved their common goal: independence and freedom. Thus they created the basis for our present State. The thought of mutual aid prompted Albert Schuster of St. Gall to create a public-spirited work for the common good, and thus the Swiss National Day Collection came into being. He was convinced that the practical spirit so characteristic of our people, was not satisfied with celebrations alone. A national day should also find expression in common action. Every year ever since 1910, an appeal goes out to the Swiss people, to support an undertaking of public benefit and collective importance for the whole of the country.

According to a decision at this year's general meeting of the

Swiss National Day Collection in Lugano, the proceeds of the collection in 1978 will be for the benefit of the Swiss abroad. The first collection for this purpose took place in 1924; subsequent collections were allocated to them every six or seven years. So far, the Fund has paid out over 10.5 million francs towards financing tasks in aid of the Swiss abroad. Each time, the Commission of the Swiss Abroad of the Nouvelle Société Helvétique, especially its secre-
