Dear Readers, Dear Compatriots,

At this time when we once again celebrate our National Holiday, I make no apologies for imparting a distinctly patriot flavour into this issue. I think it right that I should - if only because I consider the man who said "patriotism is the last resort of a scoundrel" was probably a scoundrel himself.

It is always difficult to set down original thoughts on this occasion and, anyway, Father Paul Bossard has done that so ably elsewhere in this issue. So let us attempt to look briefly at other people's patriotism because patriotism does exist everywhere to a greater or lesser degree.

It is all too easy to sneer at the patriotic sentiment in another country. It seems almost natural to dismiss it out of hand - "it's not real patriotism - only WE have that." Or - "what have THEY got to be patriotic about?" or - worst of all - we regard other people's patriotism as chauvinism. To do that makes a chauvinist of that very patriot.

During the last two years your editor has undertaken extensive business trips to eastern

and western Europe and the United States of America. It was in America that I detected a real resistance towards patriotism - in a country where such sentiments are normally held sacred. How very sad.

The reasons are, however, not difficult to find. During the past few years the U.S.A. has suffered some great traumas - not the least of which were humiliation in Vietnam, growing urban and racial problems and a fall in the value of the Dollar. All pretty new experiences to our American friends.

Happily, the U.S. is a resilient society and these rather negative and self-destructive feelings are once again being replaced by an upsurge of pride in the homeland's good points and achievements - of which there are many.

With this in mind can we not be even more thankful that unpleasant forces have not succeeded in undermining our proper thoughts of our homeland - be it where it may. Let us never sneer at others - they have feelings too. The same should apply to our private lives!
