## Mr Emil Muller

FORMER proprietor of a Luton hat materials business, Emil Hermann Muller has died at Aspley Guise, Bedfordshire at the age of 93.

Born near Lucerne in 1887, Mr Muller worked for a cheese merchant in Parma, Italy, before coming to England in 1908 to learn English.

He planned to stay for only 12 months but while working in Luton he met his future wife, Annie Florence Peach, and

decided to stay. They married in Luton in 1913 and he became naturalised the following year.

Mr Muller, who spoke five languages fluently, retired from business in the mid-1950s.

He was a musketry instructor during the First World War and became a .22 rifle shooting champion of Luton in 1924. He was also a keen golfer.

Mr Muller leaves a son, local solicitor Roy Muller, a daughter, Mrs Ruby Watts, three grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

Any Swiss Observer readers will be welcome. They are asked to bring a packed lunch for picnic. Should the weather be inclement there is a fully licenced restaurant.

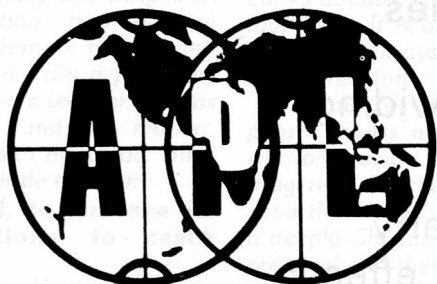
The meeting place is the car park at noon. Entrance to the gardens is 60p, and an extra 70p for the house.
