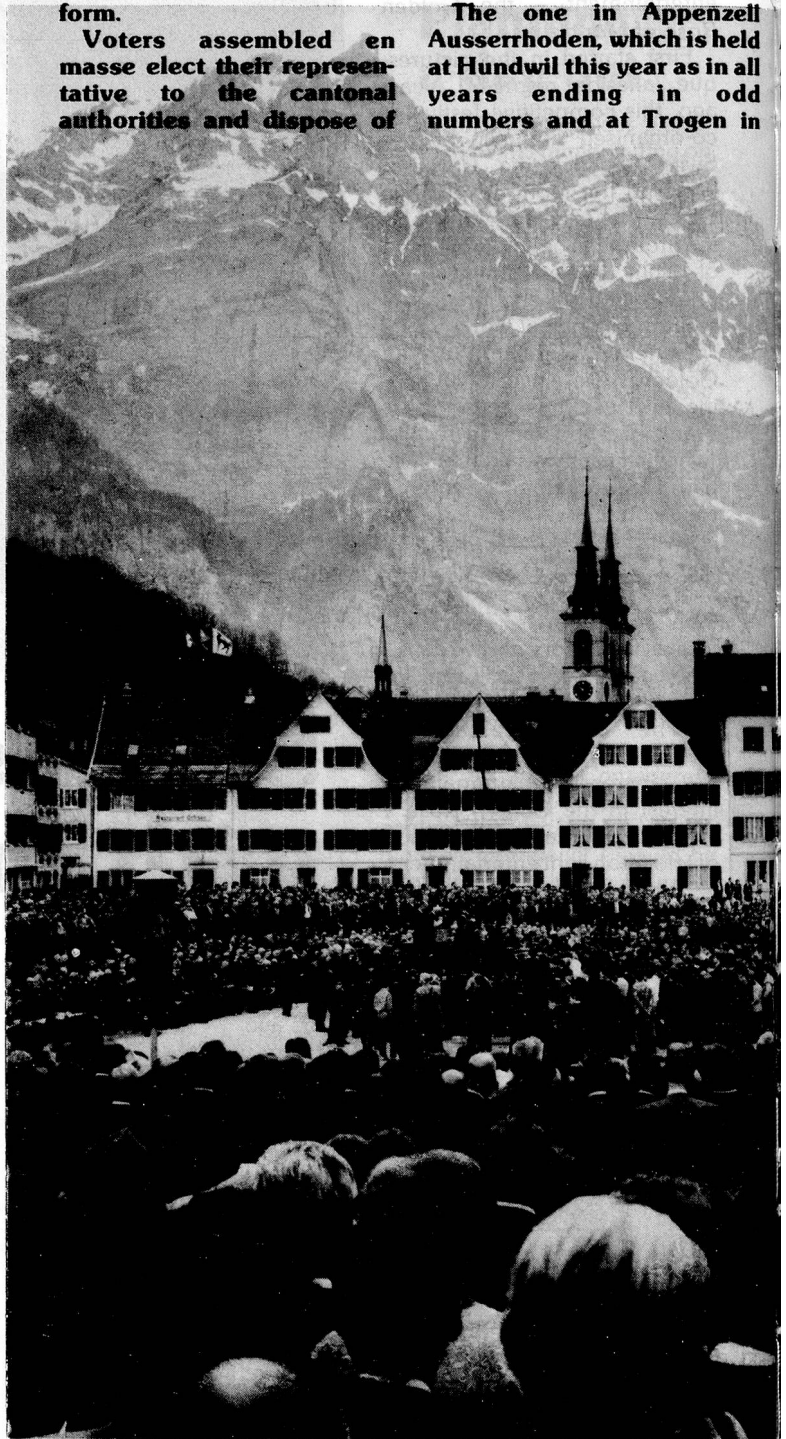
A TRADITION of a very special sort is observed at the end of April and beginning of May in five Swiss rural and mountain cantons - the *Landsgemeinde*. It is a deep-rooted example of democracy in its most genuine and vivid form.

Voters assembled en masse elect their representative to the cantonal authorities and dispose of

important business by a show of hands.

It is hard to say which of these open-air "parliaments" is the most impressive.

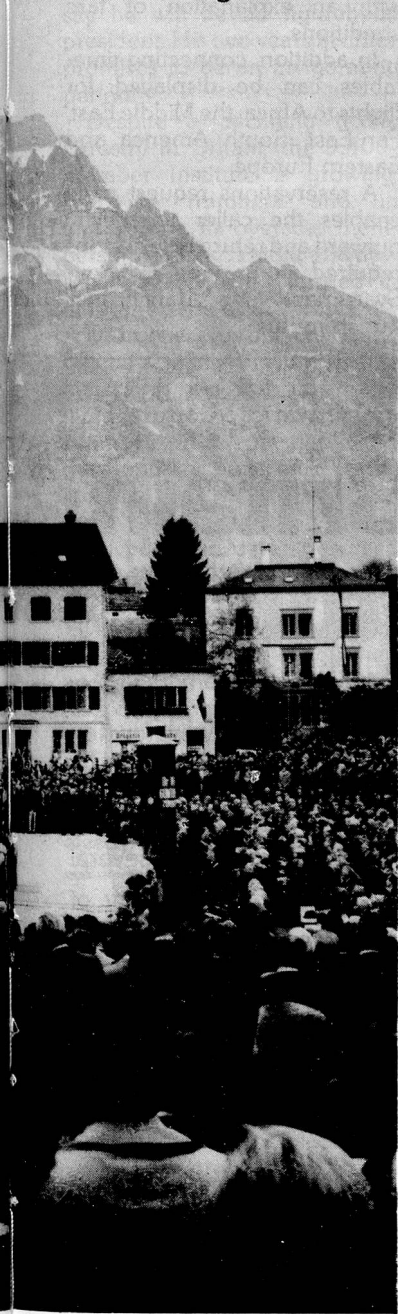
The one in Appenzell Ausserrhoden, which is held at Hundwil this year as in all years ending in odd numbers and at Trogen in



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other years, may appear particularly compact.

On the other hand the Landsgemeinden in Glarus (held in Glarus town), Obwalden (on the Landenberg near Sarnen) and Appenzell Innerrhoden (at Appenzell) are often marked by their free give and take of discussion and argument.



ON the afternoon of the first Sunday in May curious objects, carefully constructed of wooden frames richly adorned with foliage and paper streamers, make their appearance in several quarters of Bad Ragaz.

Known as "Mai-Bären", they are carried around the streets and finally some are thrown into the rushing waters of the Tamina.

The "Mai-Bären" symbolise crop demons and the custom reflects an ancient fertility rite. Youngsters who parade around with them make as much noise as they can with bells, and collect donations for their school outing fund.

There is a similar custom in several country districts of Geneva, called "Feuillu", and held on the same day.

While on the first Sunday in May in the Ticino - particularly in the Lugano district - children gather round a maypole for a custom known as "Maggiolata".

International music festivals

THREE international music festivals are being held in Switzerland this year - at Zurich from May 31 to July 2, Lucerne from August 15 to September 8, and Montreux-Vevey from August 26 to October 4.

Non-stop success

IN THE last 12 months more than 100,000 passengers have used the direct motorcoach service between Lausanne and Geneva airport. The service was started in 1971 and since then has carried nearly a million passengers.

The vehicles make 22 trips a day. The journey is non-stop, and there are no traffic lights on the route, which is mostly by motorway, bordered on either side by the countryside of Vaud and Geneva and the beautiful vineyards of La Côte.

Britons top of the list

THE popularity of Switzerland with British holiday-makers is reaching new heights. The latest figures from the Federal Statistics Office show that in January Britons accounted for 114,000 bednights, which was 38 per cent up on the previous year.

The average increase for

the first two months of the year was 43 per cent. This compares with 27 per cent for Americans, 11 per cent for French and Germans and 7 per cent for Italians.

The total of all foreign visitors in the first two months was 11 per cent. But the number of Swiss visitors showed a 2 per cent drop.

HOTELS in the famous spa resort of Baden near Zurich are again offering three-week all-inclusive arrangements during the next winter season.

Cut prices for senior citizens

ALL holders of a valid Senior Citizen Rail Card issued by British Rail are entitled to reduced hotel rates in Switzerland.

In the case of couples staying at hotels participating in the scheme, it is sufficient for one spouse to be a holder of the Senior Citizen Rail Card, and it is immaterial whether the other is of senior citizen age. The card must be shown to the hotel

receptionist on arrival.
