## Obituary: Ambassador Egbert von Graffenried

IT is with deep regret that we announce the unexpected death of the former Ambassador, Monsieur Egbert von Graffenried. He died in Berne on November 14 at the age of 72.

He had spent 40 years in the service of the Swiss Confederation, and although he had retired in 1974 he was still very active. He was president of the Wilton Park Committee, a post-war creation of the British Foreign Office to further inter-European understanding and co-operation.

He was also a member of the Council of the Solidarity Fund for Swiss Abroad. It was at the last assembly in Solothurn at the end of August that many of his friends from many parts of the world were able to meet him, not least the British contingent.

Many of us remember him and Madame von Graffenried from their years spent in London where he was First Counsellor of Legation for a few years up to 1950. They were difficult post-war years for the Swiss, and good diplomats were essential.

In 1954 Monsieur de Graffenried became the youngest aide to Federal Councillor Petitpierre, and 1955/56 he held the post of head of delegation in Korea. Then followed several posts in the Middle East and the first ambassadorial mission to Sweden in 1960.

Later he became Ambassador to Australia and New Zealand,

and his last post was Greece, a difficult task under the military dictatorship of Colonel Papadopoulos.

We who remember Monsieur and Madame von Graffenried, their keen interest in the Swiss community in England and their generous hospitality in their house in Bushey during the years of austerity deeply regret the loss of a genial Bernese patrician and diplomat of the old school.

But above all we sympathise with Madame von Graffenried and their family in their great sorrow, and we send them our heartfelt wishes.
