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THIS giant mobile TV screen, made by Omega, now makes it possible to watch a sports event on the scene and on a TV screen at the same time.

The mobile matrix scoreboard based on the most advanced video technology was inauguarated by the Swiss company at the recent Alpine ski world championships held at Schladming in Austria.

The screen reproduces numbers, text, pictures, films and TV programmes using around 13,000 lights. With a range of 16 tones of different intensities – similar to those used in TV – these lamps provide optimum visibility in practically all surrounding light conditions.

On-the-scene spectators at the world championships were thus able to follow the progress of each contestant from start to finish.

POSTBAG

As the Swiss Review came

through my letterbox in February, two months after the Council of States was expected to debate it, why couldn't Mr Paillard have given the results? Or do I have to wait until three months for the next issue? – Regular reader, Merseyside.
