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THE ARTS

AFTER a successful opening at the National Theatre in London, an exhibition on **Adolphe Appia's** life and works, prepared by the Pro Helvetia Foundation, can be seen on *May 23-28*, London, at the Institut Français, during the Swiss Cultural Week "Jours de Suisse".

Having been shown at the Crafts Council in London and various other venues, **Pierre Degen's** jewellery exhibition will now be touring in the following towns:

May 18-June 25, Belfast (Arts Council of N. Ireland Gallery).

July 8-July 31, Londonderry (Orchard Gallery).

August 9-September 3, Leeds (Temple Newsam House).

An exhibition of **Alberto Giacometti's** views of Paris, shown first at the Serpentine Gallery in London in 1981, and which has since been touring Britain, can be seen as follows:

May 16-June 3, Birmingham (King Edward's School).

June 20-July 9, Bridgwater (Bridgwater Arts Centre).

The exhibition will later visit Taunton, Birmingham, Ayr, Rochester and Aberystwyth.

An exhibition of **Paul Klee's** works will be shown from:-

May 28-July 31, Nottingham (Castle Museum).

It will be the first time a major Klee exhibition has been shown outside London. It has been prepared in collaboration with Felix Klee, the artist's son, and is sponsored by the Pro Helvetia Foundation. After Nottingham, the exhibition will move on to the Museum of Modern Art in Oxford.

Paul Klee is recognised the world over as one of the greatest painters of our time. He acquired Swiss citizenship just before his death, but his ties with Switzerland were very strong as he spent all his youth and formative years in Berne, where the Kunstmuseum and his son have the most important collections of his works.

Klee have been lent to the Arts Council by Felix Klee and are included in an exhibition entitled "Alive to it all", on show at the moment at the Serpentine Gallery, London, until March 25. After that, the exhibition will travel as follows:

May 7-June 11, Plymouth (City Art Gallery).

June 18-July 24, Sheffield (Graves Gallery).

An exhibition of **Gottfried Honegger's** paintings will be shown from:-

"Concrete" art has always been a widespread form of expression in Switzerland since its appearance early this century. Perhaps the best known Swiss artists in this field are Camille Graeser, Paul Lohse and Max Bill. However, several others – such as Honegger – have also acquired a great reputation through this form of visual art.

The Trio Zingara, London, will play **Frank Martin's** "Trio pour piano," as well as works by Haydn and Dvorak.
