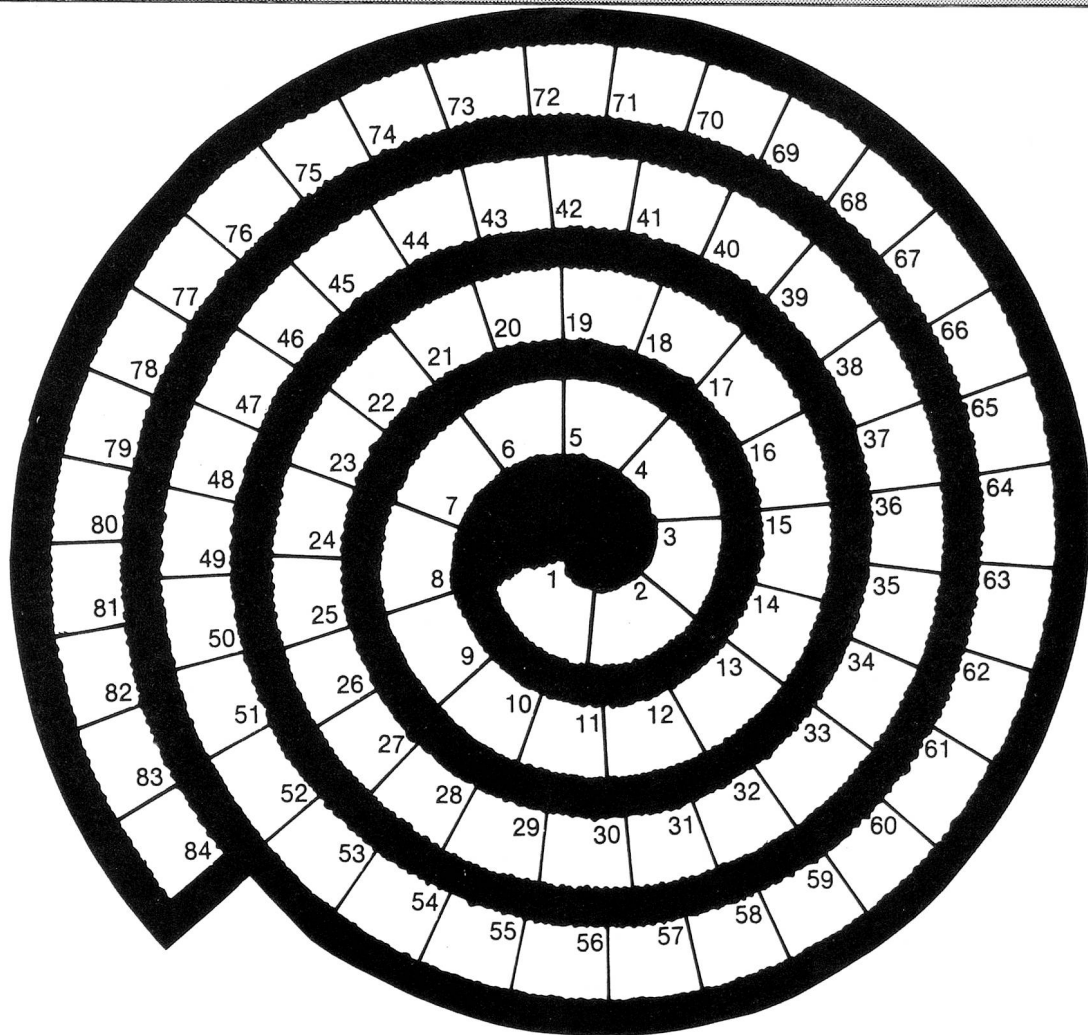

Take a turn at the Swiss Roll

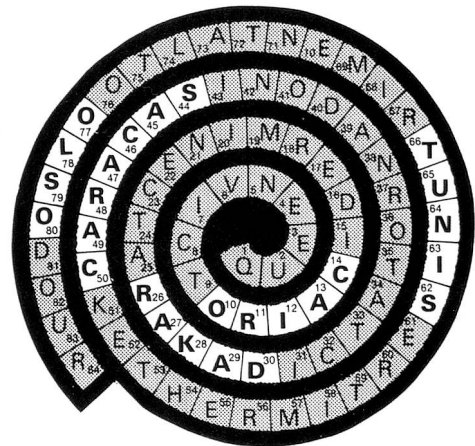


ANSWERS to the clues should be entered with the first letter in the numbered space indicated by the clue number and then proceeding outwards.

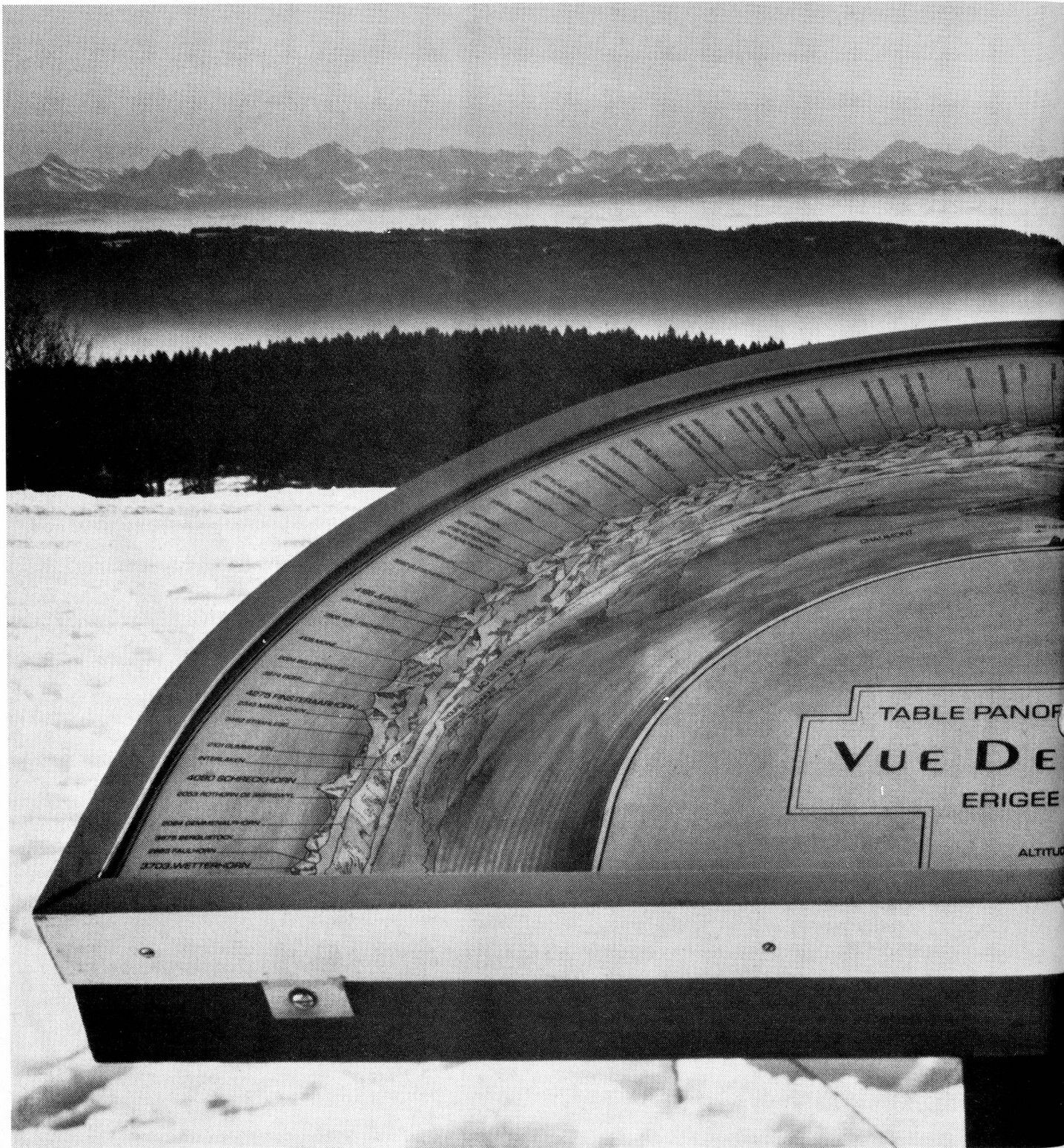

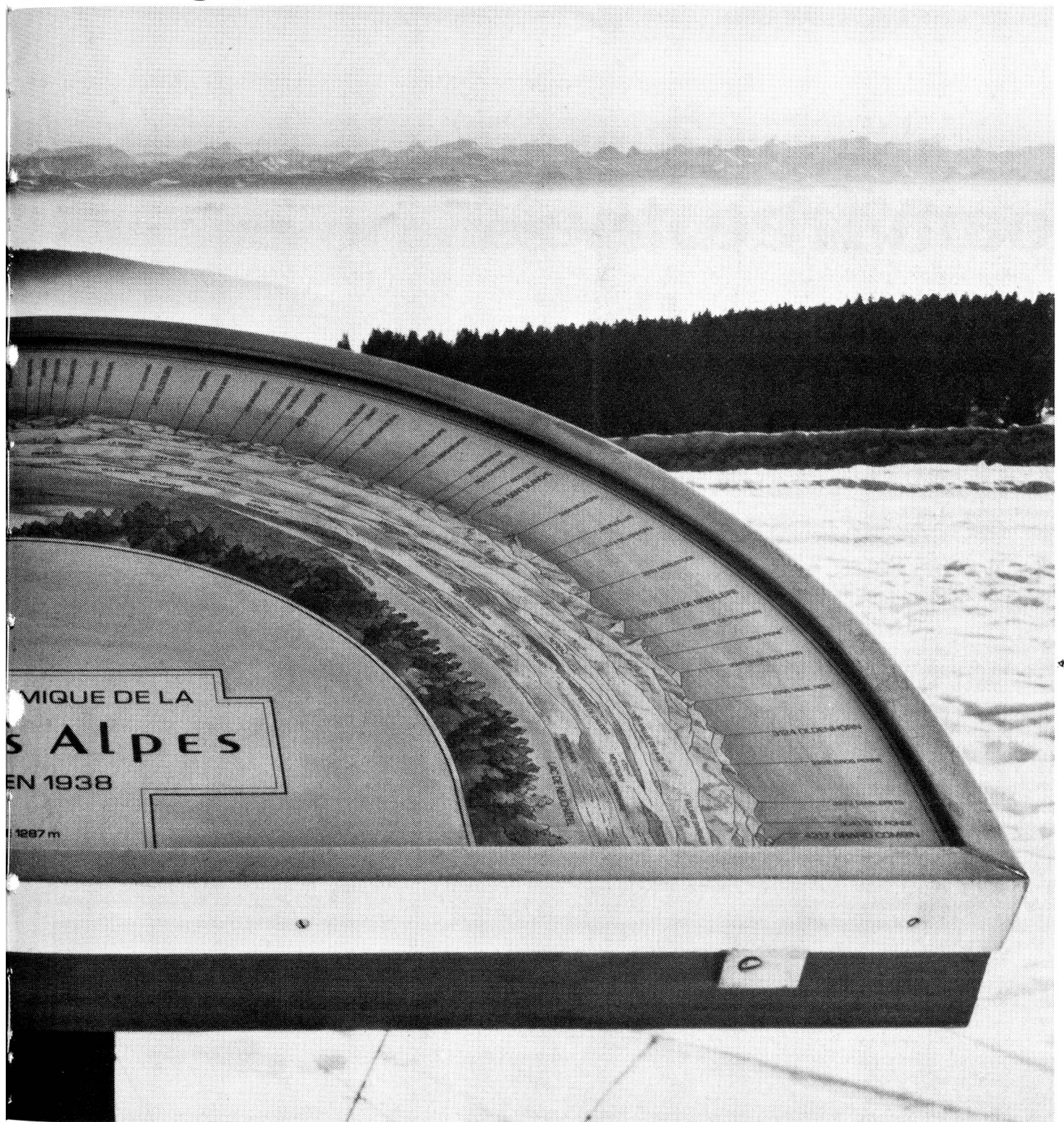
