To the Editor of the Swiss Observer.

Sir,—I feel sure that I am expressing the feelings of every subscriber of this valued and important publication called the Swiss Observer. What it does observe is sometimes quite immaterial, although that is just the thing that makes it observed, but for once it does observe something which other papers do not observe—this is the annual close season. It is probably the independent spirit of the owner, or of the times, that makes the Swiss Observer observe a non-appearance during that part of the year when every subscriber has more or less time to observe the Swiss Observer. Is this a diplomatic move on the part of the owner to prevent him observing a falling off in the subscribers' list of the Swiss Observer?

Why such a periodical as the S.O. should cease publication for four weeks just because the Editor thinks that he would like to have a holiday is incomprehensible, and only shows that the interests of the public, for which it is supposed to be run, are not studied to the extent they should be, and that the personal interest of the Editor takes first consideration. Now I would not like to make a personal attack on the hard-worked Editor, who no doubt deserves a holiday, but perhaps he would not mind accepting a hint free, gratis, and for nothing, of how he could manage to run his paper the whole year round, inclusive of the summer holidays, and not only double, but increase the circulation ten times with a minimum of labour, and what is a great factor in the newspaper world, a minimum of cost.

There must be any amount of readers here in London who would be willing to make an attempt to get into Fleet Street or the equivalent of it in a Continental place. So if the Editor would put an advert. somewhat after this style in his paper, he would undoubtedly have a large response:—

"SWISS, able to write articles, as improver in Journalism. At the end of six months a certificate will be presented to him calling him a Journalist, which would entitle the possessor to apply as such to any of the numerous papers, giving the S.O. as reference."

What a fillip this would give to an Editor in embryo, and what a flow of articles the S.O. would have for the benefit of its large circle of readers!

This would enable the Editor to take holidays as long and as often as he likes, and the paper would increase its sale, as everyone who would write for the paper would at least take ten copies so as to be able to show his friends his creation in print!

But if this closing down should happen again, it could lead readers but to two conclusions:

First, that the paper is such a well-paying concern that the Owner and Editor need not study the public (which will prove, incidentally, that all monopolies are a failure), or secondly, that the organisation of it is such a poor one that it could not be run without the Editor being present. The first evil should at once be remedied by launching an opposition paper, which will guarantee not to close down for the holidays (if it lasts as long) and which would make the Swiss Observer observe, sit up and take notice.

The second by having a staff capable of handling the work without the Editor (or has he, perhaps, to turn the handle of the printing machine himself? Then a strong office boy could do that).

Whatever may be the case, in the name of all the subscribers, a formal protest against the closing down of the Swiss Observer for the holidays is hereby lodged in the hope that the Owner and Editor and Publisher can see eye to eye with
