SWISS INDUSTRIES FAIR AT BASLE.

The 14th Swiss Industries Fair was opened on Saturday morning April 25th in the presence of large contingents of Swiss and foreign Press Reporters. In the afternoon a numerous party from the Ticino was received by Mr. R. Calini, Architect of the Fair.

For Sunday the S.B.B. arranged special trains and the Fair was visited by enormous numbers from all parts of Switzerland.

Monday was reserved for the visit of the Consular representatives from Berne and Zurich. A luncheon party was arranged and the Director of the Fair, Dr. Meile, welcomed the visitors. Several of the foreign Consuls made appropriate speeches and most of them did not fail to especially stress the development of Basle's port activities and also refer to the recent establishment of the Reparations Bank.

On Friday April 25th the Students had the pleasure of listening to a most interesting lecture by Samuel James Esq., Barrister-at-Law, who gave an intimate talk on the Old Bailey, now known as the Central Criminal Court. Mr. James briefly traced the history of this famous court, from early times, and in so doing, gave a remarkably interesting and illuminating picture of the social life of an England very different from the England of to-day, and no English person listening to the lecturer could fail to give thanks that he was living in 1930 and not in 1830. The audience then listened to a vivid description of the Old Bailey as it exists to-day and Mr. James discussed the treatment and defence of prisoners, the idiosyncracies of counsel and judges, recounting to us, en passant, many humorous incidents in his career.

Very hearty and prolonged applause greeted Mr. James at the conclusion of his lecture, and it is hoped that the school shall soon have the pleasure of hearing him again.
