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### AN IMPORTANT ANNIVERSARY

At Sainte-Croix, in the Swiss Jura, in 1814, Moise Paillard opened up a small workshop for making watches and musical boxes. Today the world-famous company that bears his name employs over five thousand men and women. Thus, in one hundred and fifty years, Paillard has grown to be the leading European manufacturer of projectors and ciné-cameras for sixteen and eight mm. films sold under the trade mark "Bolex", while one out of every twenty typewriters in use in the world today is a "Hermes". What is especially remarkable is that the biggest buyer of these articles is the country in which they were first mass-produced: the United States of America. Next in order come France and Western Germany, even though these two countries are highly industrialized and both powerful competitors.

To remain in the forefront of technical progress, Paillard Ltd. has created a research centre at Yverdon, one of the most modern of its kind in Europe, as well as research laboratories in Zurich, Lausanne-Crissier and Munich, which work in close collaboration with Swiss institutes of technology and the Swiss Horological Research Laboratory in Neuchâtel.

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### COMMISSION OF THE SWISS ABROAD

#### CORRECTION

In the report on the work of the Commission of the Swiss Abroad, the text of the constitutional article concerning the Swiss living abroad was erroneously given in its first form as proposed by the Federal Political Department on 9th December 1963. The following is the amended text as proposed by the Executive Committee of the Commission on 6th April 1964:

*La Confédération accorde son appui aux citoyens suisses résidant à l'étranger en vue de renforcer les liens qui les unissent entre eux et à la patrie, et elle soutient les institutions créées à cet effet.*

*La Confédération tient compte de la situation particulière de ces citoyens, et elle édicte les dispositions nécessaires en vue de déterminer leurs droits et obligations, notamment quant à l'accomplissement des obligations militaires et à l'exercice de leurs droits politiques, ainsi qu'en matière d'assistance; les cantons et les organisations qualifiées des Suisses à l'étranger seront consultés au préalable.*
