Eighty years ago, early in the month of May, the Swiss Section of the German Young Men's Christian Association was founded in London. The founders were Mr. Rudolf Horner, coming from Paris and in London only for a short time, and Mr. Albert Zuellig, father of "our" Mr. Albert M. Zuellig. During the decades, many devoted men have looked after the interests of the young Swiss members, and names like Samuel Zwingli, Carl Bertschinger, Jean Scheuermeier, Emil Walser will remain engraved in the annals of the organisation. In later years, it was Mr. W. Fischer, now retired at Reinach, Aargau, and Mr. W. M. Strub, at present in Lausanne, who guided the affairs of the group whose fortunes, like that of any live body, have gone up and down. To-day, Mr. Gordon Burkhalter is at the helm, and he has a group of faithful young men supporting his endeavours which he pursues with painstaking devotion.

Whilst sizeable celebrations usually take place when an organisation is 25, 50, 75 and 100 years old, it seems nevertheless right and proper to remember the Swiss Y.M.C.A. in London on their 80th anniversary, and to speed them on to the next decade with best wishes.
