MRS. TERESITA EUSEBIO

With the old year also died Mrs. Teresita Eusebio née Fedele, in her room at the Ricovero Anziani of the Ospedale Distrettuale at Faido/TI on Sunday evening, 29th December, 1974, only a few weeks from her 94th birthday.

The members of the "Coin Suisse" at Diviani Restaurant in Newgate Street, City, in the between-the-Wars years will remember her as the wife of the proprietor, Mr. Aurelio Eusebio, with whom in 1946 she retired to Fontana near Airolo in her native Canton Ticino, after a stay in London of over forty years.

Despite advancing age she kept to the last an alert mind and a good memory, and when visited from London she would insist on receiving news of her favourite patrons, and friends.

SWISSAIR APPOINTS NEW GENERAL MANAGER FOR UK AND IRELAND

We are very sorry to learn of the imminent departure of *Mr. Franz Fraefel*, who has been Swissair's General Manager for the United Kingdom and Ireland for the past five years.

Mr. Fraefel will leave his present responsibilities on 1st April and take up the newly-created position of Regional Manager, Africa (Southern Countries) based in Nairobi. Mr. Fraefel was well known to members of the Colony, in particular of the City Swiss Club, and his departure will be very much regretted. Before holding the London job, he had previously held management appointments in Switzerland and several countries abroad, including the United Kingdom as Manager for the North of England from 1953 to 1957. The region for which he now assumes responsibility comprises the countries of East, Central

and South Africa. We should like to express our best wishes to Mr. Fraefel and his family for this new part of his career.

Mr. Fraefel will be succeeded by *Mr. Louis Nart*. Having joined the Company in 1948 in Zurich, Mr. Nart had his first assignment outside Switzerland in Manchester, where he was District Manager for the North of England from 1952 to 1953. Subsequently, he was Manager for Bavaria in Munich and for South East Asia in Bangkok until 1964, when he took up his present position as Manager for South Africa in Johannesburg. In this capacity he was actively associated with Swissair's introduction of services between Switzerland and South Africa in 1968.

Mr. Nart is 49, married with two sons. We hope that he and his family will have a very pleasant stay here in London.

FOR THE GARDENER

Hollyhock (*Malvaceae Althearosea*)

These plants are hardy border perennials, but as they are somewhat subject to Hollyhock Rust it is best if they are treated as biennials or possibly annuals. They will grow to a height of well over six feet in the best conditions. These conditions would be a deep loamy soil, deeply dug if possible to a depth of 3 spits, with well rotted manure or compost well worked in. However, reasonably

respectable plants can be obtained from almost any soil. A feed of liquid manure as the flower spikes are developing does quite a lot of good and watering during dry spells is very beneficial. If one does decide to grow these plants as perennials they should be cut down to within 6 inches of the ground after flowering.

The Hollyhock is propagated from seed sown 1" deep and 2" apart in June. Pinch out to 6" apart in July and transplant to flowering positions in September. Final planting should allow 3' between plants and flowers should be removed as they fade.

To control Hollyhock Rust spray with a solution of Permanganate of Potash mixed to a Pale Rose Colour at 10 day intervals.
