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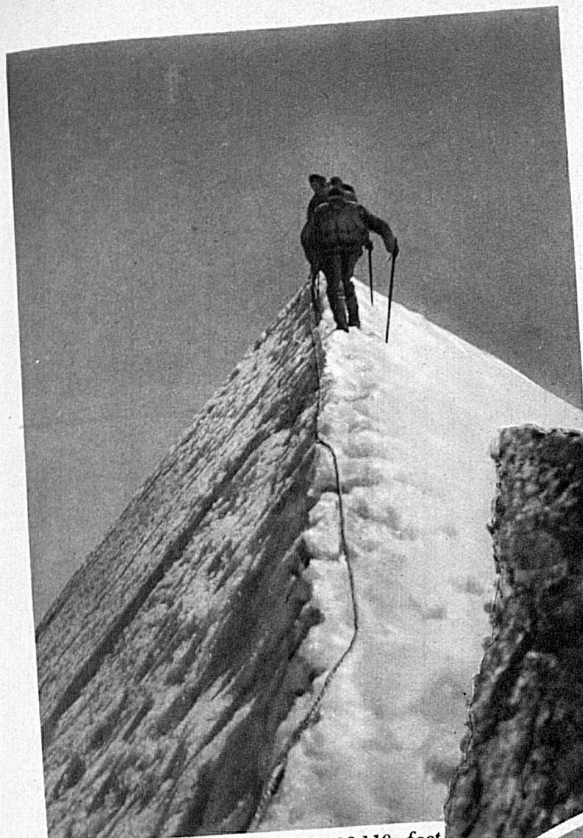
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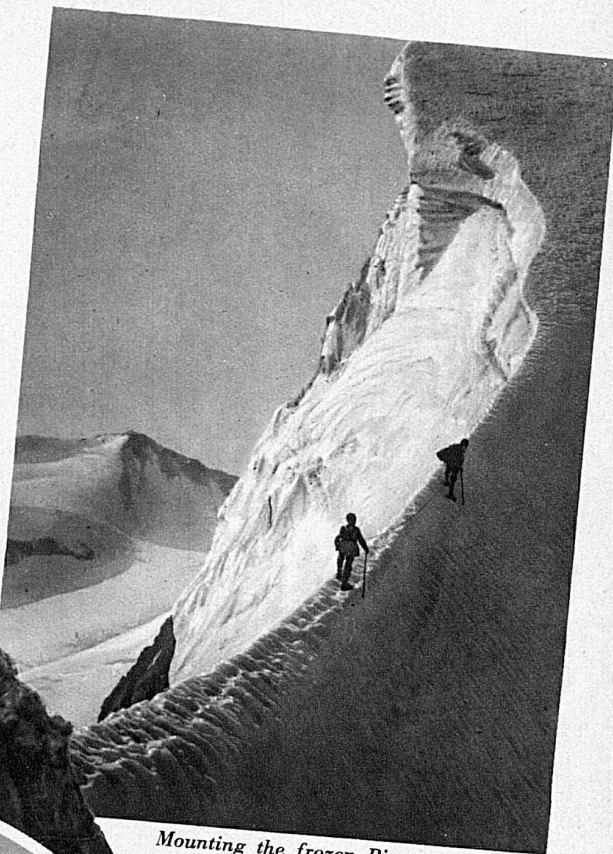
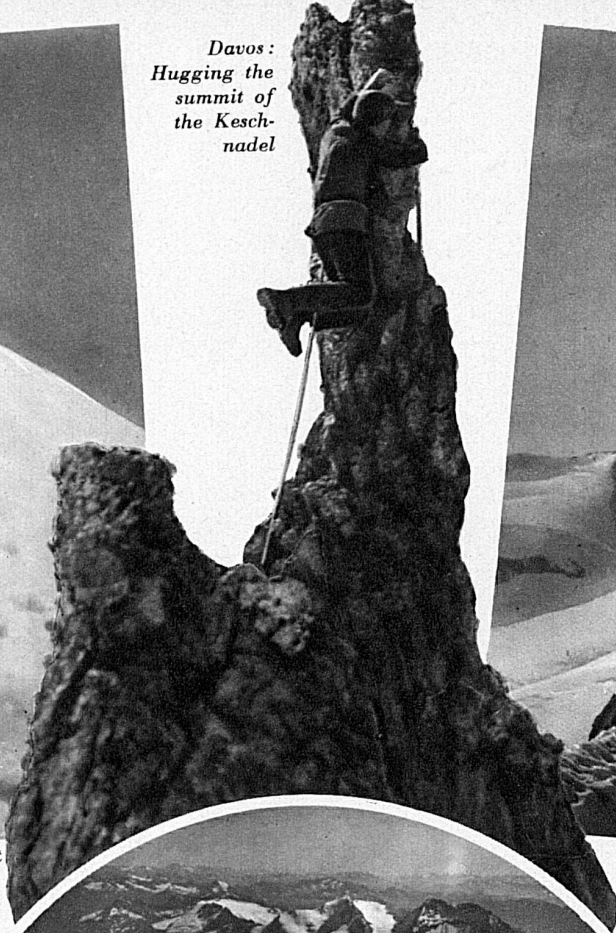
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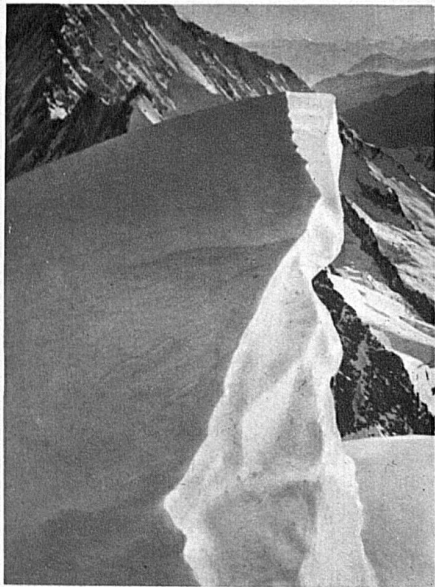

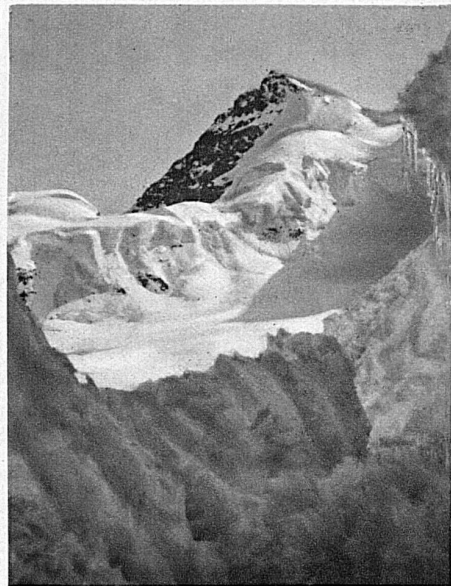

There is a surmountable mountain for everyone — and more. They rise, spectacular and wonderful from 2000 to 15,000 feet high.

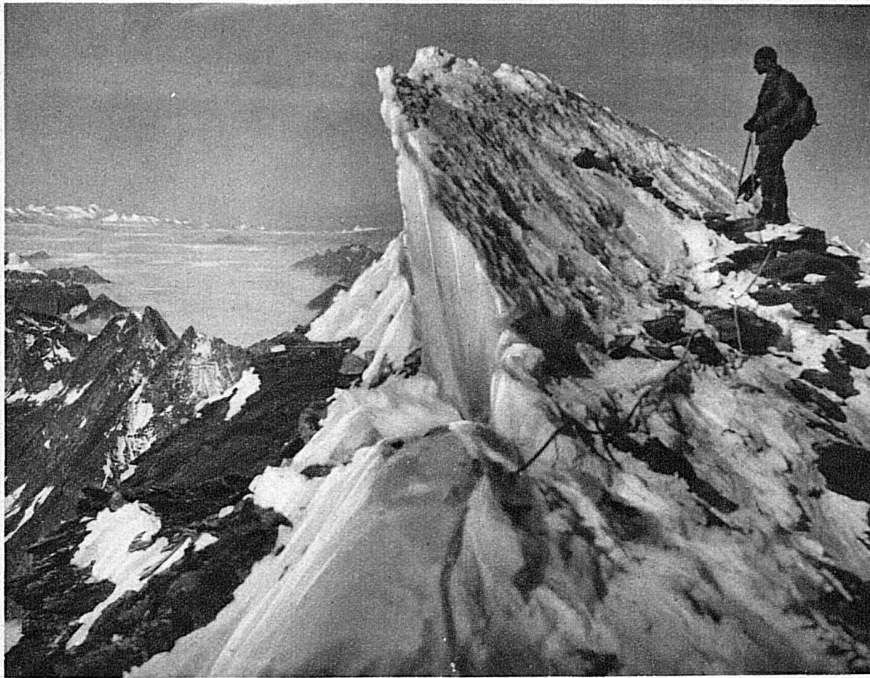
So mountaineers, take your choice!
