Bahn-Atlas Schweiz

Published by Bahn Extra, Dm19.80

As we understand it, an atlas consists primarily of maps. This is not an atlas, the only maps are cut haphazardly from the free map supplied by SNTO to advertise the various concessionary passes for visitors. It contains a quantity of well reproduced colour photographs with rather inadequate captions. There is a sort of gazetteer theme in some of the text, but this is so jumbled as to make reference difficult. It is neither atlas, album or gazetteer and so succeeds in falling between three stools.
