A: A model railway layout. Q: Oh, you're going to Genk, then - you're the fourth one this morning!).

Many SRS members attended one or more of the events in Switzerland during the summer and, hopefully, we will all hear about them through the "Swiss Express". Inevitably, though, there will be some who have been unable to visit Switzerland for one reason or another. I hope the articles in our magazine will go a little way to compensate those who have not been able to experience the fun for themselves.

The 1998 AGM is to be held in Stevenage, and I hope to see many of our Society members there. I hope you can make it. It only remains for me to wish everybody a very happy Christmas, and all the best for 1998.
