All this bodes reasonably well for the Society. All the same, we need to remain aware that any society is only as good as its members and input is always needed to keep things alive and well. Please remember my plea in my last Notes for assistance at exhibitions, not least (or only) Warley in December. Paul Hannant will be very pleased to hear from anyone who is willing to help.

Also with this issue there should be an invitation to take out, or continue with, a subscription to "Eisenbahn Amateur." This is a well-illustrated Swiss railway magazine, which shows things very much as the Swiss see them. It covers modelling as well as the prototype, with a brief section on foreign, if you are Swiss, railways – did you know the Tel Aviv to Jerusalem line has just reopened after 7 years? – and the August issue has a detailed 2-page article on the massive power failure of 22nd June.
