SRS Library

Members who attended the 2011 AGM will recall that the future of the SRS Library was discussed, due to the need to relocate it from the home of Giles Della-Gana who had hosted it for many years. In a lengthy period members had not requested any books, probably due to the heavy postal charges that would have had to be levied to send out and return them. In June 2010 the collection was split between Neil Wheelwright and Malcolm Bulpitt, who agreed to hold the contents until a decision as to their future was made. Various avenues were explored and during last year an agreement was reached with the Stephenson Locomotive Society (SLS) who had kindly offered to house the collection along with their extensive library. Therefore in January 2012 the collection was moved to the Hersham, Surrey, premises of Ian Allan Publishing where the SLS Library is located. Although books are no longer available through the post SRS members now have the opportunity to personally access the collection. The site is a 15 minute walk from Hersham Station (on the South Western Main Line out of London Waterloo) and some 15-minutes driving time from Junctions 9 or 10 of the M25. The SLS Librarian is Gerry Nichols who has supplied the following information. *"Swiss Railways Society members are welcome to use the Stephenson Locomotive Society Library at Hersham on production of their current SRS membership card. Material is loaned normally for one month but longer periods can be agreed at the Librarian's discretion. The Library is open on the 2nd Monday of the month (except Bank Holidays) from 14.00 to 17.00, and the 4th Wednesday of the month from 14.00 to 17.30. Please contact myself if you have any queries. Directions to the Hersham site are on the SLS web-site <http://www.stephensonloco.org.uk/SLSlibrary.htm> as is the Accession List."* 

SRS Archive

For a considerable number of years David Baker has been quietly working away in the background as the SRS Archivist. As noted in the AGM report David has now stood down from this role and after some deliberation the Management Committee, who express their sincere thanks to David, has decided to handle the records of the Society in a different manner, rather than leave the onus on one individual, as had been the case. The advent of digital printing and storage has opened up new opportunities to look after 'historic' data, as has the link with the SLS Library that is detailed above, so the collection is being reviewed and reallocated to safe new facilities. In the past some members' photographic collections were offered to the SRS on their death and as you can read in the Editorial the Management Committee is asking for some assistance in organising this valuable archive.

On P37 of SE109 there is a SwissTip regarding the very short Marzilibahn funicular near to the Parliament Building in Bern. When I visited this curious line in the mid-1990s I stumbled across one of the original cars a few metres away when turning right from the lower terminus. It had been 'plinthed' on a sloping section of track, but it was in-need of some loving care and protection. I have not been back but I hope that this relic has subsequently been restored. Perhaps a member visiting Bern could report back on this. In my trips to Switzerland over the years I have sadly noted that a number of funiculars have been closed so it is good that this little line is still in operation. I refer to the article in SE109 regarding Swiss politicians having special trains to party home after being elected to high office. This contrasts with a previous President (many years ago) who when asked why he travelled 3rd Class on the train allegedly replied, "Because there is no 4th Class." Now all the Members of both chambers of the Swiss parliament have a 1st Class General Abonnement - so there can be no expenses scandals in Bern (!). Of course Parliamentary Trains have a new meaning on post-privatization British railways – something The Marmot, our Swiss railwayman correspondent, may not be aware of. They are a single train in the timetable that runs just once a week, normally in one direction only, to legally keep open a line (or stations) that the Train Operating Company would like to close for lack of support or operational reasons. It is cheaper to run that train than go to the expense, and the drawn-out procedure of a Public Enquiry before the Rail Passengers Council, prior to going to the Department of Transport for a ruling.

Looking for lunch in Luzern? Tavolago, the catering arm of the SGV, who operate the ships on the Vierwaldstättersee, have developed the Seebistro Luz in one of the pavilions on the quayside opposite the main station.
