2017 AGM

Members are reminded that the Society AGM will be held at the Hallmark Midland Hotel, Derby, on Saturday 11th March. Full details were given in the December Swiss Express and are available on our website. You are also reminded that the hotel has introduced parking charges for both day visitors and residents. Roy Dunglison Memorial Seat

Working with the Brienzer Rothorn Bahn the Society has funded a Memorial Seat for installation at Planalp station on the BRB, Roy's favourite location on his favourite Swiss railway. The installation and dedication of this bench in memory of one of the Society's founders and, at the time of his death, one of our joint Presidents, has taken some time due to unavoidable delays in the reconstruction of Planalp station. The BRB has now arranged for a short dedication ceremony to take place on the afternoon of the 26th May 2017. SRS Members wishing to take part in this event should arrange to meet at the BRB's Brienz station in good time to depart at 13.45 for Planalp, for arrival at 14.15. Departure from Planalp following the dedication will be at 15.00 with arrival at Brienz station at 15.30. Alan Ramage 1943 - 2016

We have received from Roger Ramage the sad news that his brother Alan Ramage, the first editor of *Swiss Express*, died in Broomfield Hospital, Chelmsford, Essex, on the 6th November 2016. Alan was an early member of the Swiss Railways Society taking an active role in its development during the early years. He served as Fixtures/Events Officer during 1981/2 before becoming Secretary, a post he held until spring 1986. Early 1985 saw the launch of *Swiss Express*, the idea for which (and the name) was Alan's. He became its first Editor, a role he held until the autumn of 1987 when he

resigned, apparently due to illness and other commitments. From that point he became less involved with the Society and gradually faded from the scene over the following few years. John Jesson the current Chairman recalls going to Switzerland in 1985 and 1986 on successful trips organised by Alan for his train driving and railway colleagues at London's Waterloo Station. Thanks to his brother we have learnt that prior to working at Waterloo Alan had started his career on the main line from London Kings Cross, where he had worked as a fireman/driver on such railway icons such 'Flying Scotsman' and 'Mallard'. He also drove the replica of George Stephenson's 'Rocket' during the 1980 celebrations of the 150th anniversary of the Stockton and Darlington Railway. In 1983, whilst driving a Waterloo-Southampton train, Alan had the unusual and frightening experience of an attempted hijacking of his train that resulted in his being attacked in his cab, however he and a colleague managed to apprehend the culprit. Although he received recognition, and a certificate, from BR Southern Region for his courage the incident took a toll on his long-term health and confidence, causing him difficulties in future years. This did not stop him from doing some freelance writing, also some local broadcasting, plus making visits to Switzerland, which he loved.

I was interested to read the comment in Swiss News, on P31 of Swiss Express No. 128, under the title 'Coffee Out – Beer In.' As a member of CAMRA (Campaign for Real Ale) I totally agree with the sentiment that the SBB showed a 'lack of potential initiative' regarding the promotion of the excellent craft beers now produced in Switzerland. I decided to contact the SBB about this and I attach a slightly edited version of their response.

"Thank you for your e-mail. I'm glad that you're asking this. I agree with you, and because of this I asked the responsible person. Apparently due to the national operation of the dining car, it is very difficult to handle it with only one partner. We have to restock the coaches on several stops of the train. With only one partner this would be quite hard - we should have to build storage service at several points to cover this. Moreover the acceptance of the brand throughout Switzerland plays a central role. These are apparently the reasons".

BOOK REVIEW

Swiss Mountain Climbing - the easy way



am sometimes asked, "Why Switzerland?" and in reply, I certainly have no shortage of examples of scenic delights to be explored and enjoyed when travelling on terra firma using railways, trams or PostBus services. That said, this latest addition to the range of Swiss Express Publications adds a further dimension to the travel options to be considered by illustrating how the Swiss have made it so easy to reach and explore many of its superb mountains. Published in A4 format, the 120 pages are packed with information supported by a splendid set of colour illustrations, many of which have been sourced from



the on-line Wikimedia library. Following a brief introduction and a setting of the scene, the author provides well-informed background information in turn on rack-and pinion railways, funiculars, cable cars, chairlifts, lifts and gondelbahns with each topic supported by a comprehensive table presented in a regional format. The regional structure used is in line with the format employed in the earlier publication dealing with the Swiss PostBus network and is intended to assist the reader in reviewing wider travel options when planning a visit to a particular part of Switzerland. The author reminds us repeatedly that planning is indeed essential as not all services are timetabled, some operate on demand and a good number are seasonal. That said, the 370 routes described provide ample scope for visits to higher and generally more remote locations be it for winter sports, summer walks or to simply enjoy the vista of a pastoral landscape or alpine view. Within this excellent book you will find the shortest public funicular, the highest cable station in Europe and the means to maybe spot a dragon on Mount Pilatus. This book is highly recommended. **DCG**

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
