



1946 Ski Fashions

Winter sports holidays are attracting members of the fair sex more and more each year. The hours spent in the snow-fields bring relaxation, pleasure and well-being. But correct equipment is essential. Streamlined ski trousers have won the day. Short, amusing and very feminine skirts — but for champions only. Jackets and over-blouses must express the ski girl's taste and personality.

The 1945/46 Ski-ing Season opened on December 15th 1945. December and January days in the Alps are generally very cold with heavy snow-falls. Ski girls should wear *long tailored jackets* (Fig. 1 and 2); fabric: first quality poplin made of long fibred twisted cotton yarn; cut: modern, practical, allowing perfect freedom of movement. Zip fastener from top to bottom will help to avoid disarranging the hair. Lots of pockets. Strong belt. Caps instead of hoods.

Topee caps (Fig. 3), the latest thing. Very practical, girls! And how chic if made to match your jacket. Mitts to match in the same material and colour. Sisters of less sporty type will prefer long, cosily lined poplin or gabardine jackets in bright, gay shades or white (Fig. 4).

For tea or cocktails: slacks instead of the streamlined trousers, fancy « after-ski » footwear.

Smart, fancy blouses (Fig. 5), with or without embroidery, in luminous shades.

February-March are the sun-lovers' months. On fine days, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., *light-weight over-blouses or jackets* are indicated, preferably in *swagger styles* for wear without a belt (Fig. 6). Bright, audacious colours: vivid green, red, royal blue, emerald, sunshine yellow, and so on. Harmony colour schemes to match the sunshine, the gayness of it all — and your sunburn. Bold contrasts. Peasant embroidery, but only if very finely worked.

Ski wear has been revolutionized since ski lifts came into being. 15 minutes to go up, 15 minutes to come down the run. Unexpected weather changes no longer mean a thing. Even on merely fair days you can wear *light-weight* ski outfits in good quality, water and windproof fabrics.


