# London Symbol of Success

In the spring of 1967, cotton will be the IN fabric in the blouse sector, especially for shirt blouses in crepon which already topped the lists last season. But while last year op-art designs in black and white, and plain fabrics in delicate pastel shades were all the rage, the emphasis this year has switched — for sporting and youthful crepon, as well as for voile (also in Terylene®) and the more feminine cotton satin — to brighter colours: apple green, mimosa, lilac, riviera blue, beige, purple, orange, emerald and fuchsia, in wide or narrow stripes, checks or other more traditional designs. Crepon is popular not only for its wrinkled tree-bark look, but also because it is easy to wash by hand (but not by machine!) and the crêpe effect — woven into the fabric — is permanent; in addition it is light and soft in spite of its firm handle, absorbent and pleasant next to the skin. London manufacturers use it for a great number of models, some of which we show here. The most sporting models are unmistakably inspired by men's shirt styles.







Men's shirts too have switched to crepon. In men's wear, plain fabrics have also been replaced this spring by stripes of all kinds and certain manufacturers even produce the same model — except for size and a few details here and there — for both Him and Her! Men rate very highly the above mentioned advantages of crepon.

We have also noticed new creations for men, successfully combining the two trends of British fashions, i.e. an innate sense for both dressy wear and casual sporting elegance. We are thinking here of the dressy shirts for formal and semi-formal leisure-wear. For example, we saw a shirt with white geometric Jacquard designs on a pale blue baptiste ground, another with an embroidered front, decorated with a double pleated flounce, in white on a white ground for the more conservative, and on a pale blue ground for men of a more modern turn of mind. All these novelties were launched at the Harrogate convention, the annual exhibition of the Menswear Association of Britain, at which some 200 exhibitors present their novelties in men's fashions.
