The sculptor Robert Lienhard

The sculptor Robert Lienhard was born in Winterthur in 1919 and grew up in the same town. The artistic climate of this town was largely influenced – besides by the large collections – by Paris. Lienhard elected to complete his artistic education in Italy, in 1936. In Milan he became a pupil of Francesco Messina in the Brera sculpture class. He returned to Switzerland in 1940 and his work showed a gradual movement away from his mentor. He moved on from the standing figure motif to that of the moving group. From 1951 to 1956 he was occupied by the large sculpture for the Platzspitz installation in Zurich. Later on the figure was reduced to disc and spar elements, the dynamic possibilities explored. There then followed an architectural phase which led him to a series of works for buildings, predominantly for schools and churches. Today he spends half of the year in the canton of Ticino, within striking distance of Milan.

The Hector Hodler Bequest to the Museums of Geneva, Berne and Zurich

On his death in 1920, Hector Hodler, son of the great Swiss painter Ferdinand Hodler and Geneva-born Augustine Dupin, left an important collection of his father's work. In his will he stipulated that this should be distributed, on the death of his wife, to the three art galleries of Zurich, Berne and Geneva. Madame Hector Hodler died last year in Nice and the three museums each received an equal share of 40 oils and 225 drawings, among which were paintings of Hodler's immediate circle, studies for his best-known works and late landscapes.
