CITY SWISS CLUB.

Monthly Meeting held on 7th September, at Pagani's Restaurant.

This meeting was attended by thirty members and friends, Mr. L. Jobin, Vice-President, taking the Chair. Our devoted President, Mr. C. Marchand, who anticipated presiding at the Meeting, unfortunately was unable to do so, due to his train from the Continent being nearly three hours late.

The Chairman opened the Meeting at 8.50, after having duly honoured the toasts to H.M. the King and La Suisse.

He extended a cordial welcome to the guests, Mr. Borsinger, Chargé d'Affaires of the Swiss Legation, Messrs. Guignard, Eigeldinger and Jobin. Mr. Borsinger replied in a charming little speech, stating how touched he was by the effort of the C.S.C. in respect of the collection made for the victims of the recent cyclone in Switzerland.

The Secretary read the minutes of the last monthly Meeting held on 3rd August, which were unanimously accepted and adopted.

The Chairman, Mr. L. Jobin, read a letter received from the Swiss Legation, acknowledging with thanks receipt of £58 7s. 6d., the result of the collection made by the C.S.C. for the benefit of the victims of the recent disasters in the Jura, Central and Eastern Switzerland.

Mr. R. de Cintra read a letter from the N.S.H., asking for our financial support in view of the present difficulties they were experiencing. A prolonged discussion followed, Mr. P. F. Boehringer giving the Club details of the present activities of the N.S.H.

It was unanimously resolved to make a special donation of 10 guineas to the N.S.H.

Mr. Charles William Guignard and Mr. Oscar Jaeggi, were unanimously elected active members.

A further letter from the N.S.H. dated 1st September, was read, soliciting the Club's support in connection with a lecture to be given shortly on "The Schnapsgefahr (Eau-de-Vie) Question." This matter received full consideration, and it was unanimously decided that in view of the fact that the C.S.C.'s aims are purely social, it was impossible for the Club to take an interest in political matters.

The Meeting closed at 9.50 p.m., and a record number thereafter paid tribute to our "great national sport" of Jass, or maybe Bridge. M. G.

A Meeting of Delegates was held at the Union Helvetia on July 1st last, to approve the accounts for 1925/26; Mr. Barbezat, the President, was in the chair. Owing to various sums of money not having been paid to the Hon. Treasurer by that date, he was not able to give the accounts completed, but he informed the meeting that he expected a surplus of about £30. Upon this assurance it was decided to give £12 to the Fonds Dimier and £12 to the victims of the cyclone disaster in Switzerland. The balance was voted to the Reserve Fund.

The outgoing Committee was re-elected *en bloc* for the ensuing year. The place and date of next year's Sports Meeting was left to the Committee, as the Delegates expressed a strong wish that an effort should be made to find a ground with less drawbacks than Herne Hill.
