Excursion to Kenwood, Saturday, June 20th 1931.

About forty students from the S.M.S. College assembled at 9.30 a.m. ready to explore once more the sylvan beauties of Kenwood and the Art Gallery bequeathed to the nation by the late Earl of Jveagh. The weather was kind and some time was spent in strolling through the lovely grounds before repairing to the Art Collection itself. Great interest was displayed in the remarkable array of old Masters such as Gainsborough and Reynolds, before setting off to Hampstead Heath. Unfortunately the mist obscured the rather fine view usually obtained from the Spaniards Road, but an interesting morning was well spent.

On Saturday, July 4th, nearly 200 students under the leadership of Mr. John W. Klein, B.A.—visited Windsor. For more than two hours our party admired the beauties of the magnificent Castle and the sumptuous State Apartments. The gorgeous Banqueting Hall awakened special interest. No less interesting, in its way was the Queen's Dolls' House, a perfect little model of the splendid Royal apartments at Whitehall. We all envied the King his exquisitely laid out gardens and his richly-stocked wine cellars. We then ascended the Keep, from the summit of which a magnificent view of the "winding" river (from which Windsor derives its name) and of the surrounding country was obtainable.

After luncheon our party visited Windsor Great Park and walked down the superb elm avenue to the famous Copper Horse, a magnificent equestrian statue of King George III towering on a huge block of granite on the summit of Snow Hill. We then continued our journey, passing the quaint old Obelisk erected to the memory of "Butcher" Cumberland, the victor of Culloden, the last battle fought on British soil. Finally we reached Virginia Water, surely the most beautiful artificial lake in all England. The railway officials at the little country station were somewhat surprised at the arrival of such a large number of people and it was only with the greatest difficulty that we could all be crammed into the rather short train. At 7.30 we arrived in London in the highest spirits (there had been some excellent community singing on the return journey) after having spent a most enjoyable day.
