**FAUNA OF THE SWISS NATIONAL PARK.**

The area of mountain, forest and valleys comprising the Nature reserve which forms the Swiss National Park is a tract of country that is rigidly preserved. Its fauna and flora are subjected to the minimum of interference on the part of man and for this reason afford many problems of special interest to the biologist. Under the auspices of the Swiss National Park, a series of quarto memoirs on researches undertaken in that area is being published. The sixth memoir in that series has recently come to hand and deals with the forest insects of the Park ("Les Insectes Forestiers du Parc National Suisse." Pp. 50 + 24 plates. Aarau: H. R. Sauerländer et Cie. 12 francs). Its author, Dr. Aug. Barbey, mentions that the circumstances in which these insects were studied were purely economic and were in connexion with the ravages they cause among the forest trees. The life-history, mode of life and economic status of the more important species of insects are described. Various stages in their life-cycle, their larval burrows in wood and bark and other phases of these insects are admirably portrayed in the series of plates that accompany this memoir. Their ecological relations are also dealt with whether they be destructive forms, parasites or predators.
