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CONCERT NEWS.

"La Suisse Qui Chante."

I wonder whether you, dear Reader, are waiting for this article? Concert news are so commonplace these days that I expressly mentioned last week that this concert is a special one. I used this word because the concert is a new departure from what the two societies, the Nouvelle Société Helvétique and the Swiss Orchestral Society, have hitherto presented to you. You remember, of course, the joint ventures offered to you by these two societies some years ago when Monsieur Jean Bard, the dramatic author and professor of elocution at the conservatoire of Geneva, produced a most interesting programme from his repertoire of French poetry and prose; then a little later Frau Else Zueblin-Spiller under the title of "Erinnerungen an die Grenzbesetzungszeit," as our Schweizer Soldatenmutter, gave us a most interesting lecture with lantern slides from her varied experiences during the years of 1914-1919. All these programmes were framed by music rendered by the Swiss Orchestra and its soloist friends. — For two years the opportunity of a joint concert did not present itself, — but now it is here again and we want you to know about this new venture, we don't want you to mise a note of the date, — we don't want you to mise it!

Have you heard the songs rendered by the Misses Marietta and Martha Amstad? If your Radio is a good one and gives you Beromünster to your hearts delight — then you must have heard the sisters Amstad. They sing the most lovely Swiss songs as soli, as duets, some from eastern Switzerland, some from the Suisse

Romande and, of course, some canti ticinesi. Here just a few items to make your mouth water: "O du liebs Aengeli" (Bernese), "Schönster Abestärn" (vom Aargau), "Dr. Zauberspruch" (vom Pestalozzi), "Coucou, canari jaloux" (de Neuchâtel), "Sur la route d'Estavayer," "Dorni, dormi bel bambin," etc., etc. — all made and rendered to bring you out of yourself and take you back to Switzerland. The sisters Amstad are also known here to the B.B.C. — did you hear them broadcast from London last year? Well, — here is a fine opportunity for you to hear these famous artists close to in a comfortable seat in that very fine concert hall, The "Conway Hall."

But, dear Reader, this is not all. To take not only your heart, but your entire self right back to your Homeland for just one evening. I had the luck to be introduced recently to Miss Idy Frei. Now she also sings, but quite differently from the Misses Amstad. She Yodels! And can she Yodel? Well, — read these few tiltes: "Grüssti Gott mys Schwyzerländli," "Die Schwyzerische Meitschi," "Vo Luzärn gäge Wäggis zue," — of course, the latter everyone knows, — but you can't sing it like Idy sings it, — and by the way, Idy will show you what a strapping young Swiss girl looks like in real Schwyzertracht. —

Schwyzertracht. — I should, of course, say something about the Orchestra. That little band is an attraction in itself! (Blow your own Trumpet if nobody else blows it for you). Well you probably heard them last June at Central Hall, Westminster, and on many previous occasions, so they don't need introducing. They merely think that the picture presented by the above Swiss Ladies needs a frame, the Swiss Hymn at one end and the "Bärner Marsch" at the other, — a centre piece (to give the soloists a rest) by Mendelssohn, comme pièce de résistance; the approach to and the running through the St. Gothard Tunnel of our most famous Swiss trains by "Orpheus" and more if time permits.

And do you know that this splendid programme can be heard for the modest sum of 1/8d. plus tax — a florin will cover the lot! Invite your English friends, so many have been to visit our lovely country this summer, — it will bring back sweet memories to them and it will make others wonder what it's like over yonder, "Aenet em Bärgli im Trueb."


The President then gave some information about the Annual Dinner of the Club, which will take place next month at the Grosvenor House.

SWISS DANCER'S RECITAL.

Inspiration from Pictures and Animals.



Several original dances of her own creation, including a new Temple Dance and a remarkable dance with masks representing the Spirit of Evil in varying guises, will be a feature of the special recital of dramatic and creative dancing which the Swiss dancer, Marcelle Valerie, is to give on October 14th at the Rudolf Steiner Hall. M. Paravicini, the Swiss Minister, is expected to be present with members of his staff.

Marcelle Valerie, who has been compared by a critic with the great Italian actress, Eleanora Duse, owing to the spirituality of her work, apart from its more dramatic form, has devoted years of painstaking study, not only to the technicalities of Ballet and Eurhythmics under the famous masters, Cecchetti and Dalcroze, but also to a thorough understanding of music at the Geneva Conservatorium. Marcelle Valerie, in fact, believes that a close study and appreciation of classical and good modern music are of immense benefit for the full development of a dancer's art. This original Swiss dancer, who has previously given successful recitals of her work in this country, has always taken a deen interest in the

This original Swiss dancer, who has previously given successful recitals of her work in this country, has always taken a deep interest in the allied arts of painting, sculpture and the theatre. She regards their study as essential in perfecting her dancing, which conveys to her audience her mastery of technique and at the same time appears so refreshing and original in her own particular interpretations of spiritual and dramatic themes.

Marcelle Valerie, although a devotee of the old masters in painting and sculpture, closely follows developments in modern art by attending all important art exhibitions. She has often found inspiration by studying the movements of animals at the London and Continental zoos.
