Delaloye, a former Chairman of the Union Helvetia Club. He paid a special tribute to the Rev. Hahn, saying that his departure was greatly regretted by the members. He also eulogised the Ladies.

Mr. A. Schmid then addressed the gathering, thanking Mr. Wyss for having for so many years taken a leading part in organising with great success these dinners, "we pity the person," he said, "who has no friends."

Pastor C. Th. Hahn shortly thanked Mr. Indermaur for the kind words he had spoken saying that in helping, wherever it was necessary, he had only done his duty.

Mrs. M. Kummer, shortly and in a very humorous way, replied on behalf of the Ladies and guests.

The Banqueting hall was then cleared and dancing started shortly before mid-night. During a dancing interval, a "Ticinese" who hides his identity under the professional name of Howard De Courcy, intrigued the company with some efficient conjuring.
