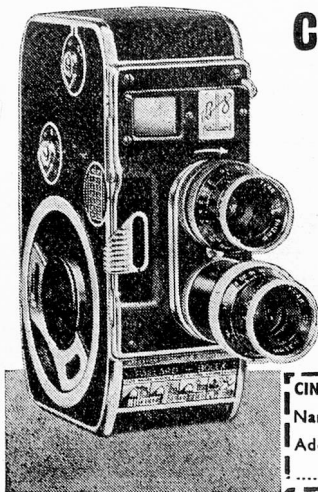

The meeting was followed by a talk on "Scotland, its Laws, Customs and Clans", by Mr. W. D. Grant, A.C.I.S., who has been a member of the Teaching Staff of the College since 1953.

The audience revealed its keenness with numerous questions to which Mr. Grant replied with alacrity. The spontaneous round of applause at the close best revealed how much his talk had been appreciated.
