NEWS FROM THE COLONY

SWISS CLUB MANCHESTER

On the 8th of October the Swiss Club Manchester met in the premises of the Italian Club to hear a talk given by Mr. Richard Müller entitled "*A World of Contrasts*" illustrated by slides taken by Mr. Müller, who is a member of the Swiss Club Manchester and President of the Yorkshire Swiss Club. As our friends and members who attended his previous talks knew in advance that he is an outstanding photographer, a mountaineer and a speaker who can grip an audience, it is not surprising that the meeting was very well attended.

"*A World of Contrasts*", the title of the talk showed many aspects of the world as seen through a camera on slides with a most remarkably lucid explanation of some technicalities, which was necessary for the mostly non-technical audience to understand the contrasts — contrasts between black and white and coloured photography, between architecture old and new, domestic and business; contrasts between sun and shade, summer and winter — contrasts in heights and horizons; photographs of a climb of Monte Rosa at several stages of the climb, showing the route and the views from the summit.

One could feel that Mr. Müller is not only a keen mountaineer but one who can express his love of the mountains and of our countryside in a way that passes his enthusiasm on to his audience.

Finally we were shown contrasts between the "Landi" of 1939 and the "EXPO" in a few pictures of works of art from both, followed by others of the EXPO by day and night, these last showing the beautiful colours used by the designers. Those who had seen the EXPO were reminded of their pleasure — and some expressed their regret in not having had the chance to have been there.

On this theme Mr. Müller ended his talk which had enraptured his audience for one hour and a half, at the end of which everyone would have wished for more and thought the time had passed too quickly.
