SWISS CHEESE CHANGES SHAPE

With the growing success of cheese in pre-packaged portions, it was realised that the preparation of portions from rounds of cheese involved losses of 20 to 25%, owing to wastage. The Americans were the first to think of manufacturing their cheese in squares instead of the traditional rounds. In order to follow this trend, the Swiss Association of the Cheese Trade asked a number of Swiss manufacturers to make square blocks of Gruyère cheese by way of a test. The manufacturing process remaining the same, the quality of Switzerland's renowned cheeses will not be affected in any way by this change of shape which provides a tasty solution to the problem of squaring the circle!

SWISS MANUFACTURER WINS FIRST PRIZE

For strategic reasons, the railway systems of Spain and Portugal were formerly built with a wider gauge than that of the rest of the European network. As a result, it is impossible for waggons or carriages from one network to run on the other, which is a ridiculous situation in this day of the development of international trade. Consequently, at the request of the Spanish and French Railways, the International Railway Union organised a big international contest to devise a bogie with a variable wheel-base, for fitting on carriages and waggons having to travel on both wide and normal gauge lines. The first prize in this international contest was recently awarded to a Swiss company, the Vevey Engineering Works, which specialise among other things in the manufacture of rolling stock. The prize-winning system allows for a transition section in which the distance between the rails passes gradually from the wide to the normal track, accompanied by a device allowing the wheels to "float" on their axles and thus pass gradually from one gauge to another, at walking speed, while, outside the transition section of the line, the wheels remain securely locked to their axles, at the right distance.
