Six years ago, Dr. rer. pol. K. P. Jaggi arrived in this country with his wife and two boys. A week or so ago, he and his family returned to Switzerland to the great regret of a number of friends in Great Britain and the Manchester Swiss Club in particular.

Dr. Jaggi was born in Bienne in 1930. He studied economics at the universities of St. Gall and Fribourg and then joined J. R. Geigy in Basle. He travelled for this chemical concern until his arrival in Great Britain and took up work with Geigy (U.K.) Ltd.

He settled at Boydon in Cheshire and began to take a lively interest in the Swiss community in Manchester and the surrounding districts. Two years ago, he was elected President of the Manchester Swiss Club, an office he held with efficiency and charm. The Swiss community in this country is the poorer for losing the Jaggis. Best wishes accompany them in their new field of activities.

The Swiss Club Manchester has to look for a new President. Until they have found one, the affairs are in the capable hands of their Vice-President, Mr. B. Simon. Good luck!

THE "SWISS OBSERVER"

30 YEARS AGO

"The present circumstances are compelling us to make some different arrangements as regards the publication of our paper.

Owing to the fact that practically no Swiss newspapers are reaching us at present, we are unable to keep up our news page; we have therefore decided to print the Swiss Observer until further notice, in a reduced size, giving our readers news of the Colony, communications from the Swiss Legation, etc."

This is what appeared, under the heading "to our readers", on the first page of the Swiss Observer of 9th September 1939. It must be pointed out that the "reduced size" of the paper has been kept ever since. Before that day, the Swiss Observer had approximately the same format as the "Evening Standard".

There was in fact very little news in that issue: a relation of General Guisan's career, news of his recent election as commander-in-chief of the Swiss Army by the two chambers, the "temporary" closing-down of the National Exhibition in Zurich, the pledge by Italy to respect Swiss Neutrality and the receipts of the Federal Railways in July, 1939, compared with those of the corresponding period in the previous year.

The legation transmitted the following advice to Swiss citizens resident in the U.K., — "Mobilised Swiss will receive fresh, individual orders from the Legation regarding date, time and place of departure from London by special train. This train *will not be available* for non-mobilised persons. . . . the traffic conditions and communications with the Continent are such that *under no circumstances* should the Swiss undertake the journey from England to Switzerland at present. . . . The Legation's definite advice to all Swiss is: to remain in their present place of residence in the United Kingdom and to take the normal, officially specified precautions for their safety, in the same way as everyone else is doing. As soon as circumstances permit, all enquirers who have given their addresses to the Legation will be notified concerning the possibility of returning to Switzerland at a later date".

The Editor, Mr. Stauffer then presented an editorial entitled "WAR", decrying the total lack of the sense of honour shown by the German Reich, underlining the fact that, due to her neutrality, Switzerland was not going to take sides in what was a struggle between democracies and a dictatorship but should Germany venture to disregard that neutrality, he would not find the Swiss unprepared. They would, in the spirit of Sempach and Morgarten, defend their glorious country to the last drop of blood. Mr. Stauffer ended his message urging Swiss residents to fight in their heart for their host country, who, in fighting for Freedom and Liberty, was fighting *their* battle.
