Re SERVICES IN GERMAN AT THE SWISS CHURCH.

To the Editor of *The Swiss Observer*.

Sir,—With reference to the enquiry which is being made at present among the members of the German-speaking congregation, regarding the future arrangements for Divine Service in German, I beg respectfully to submit that in my opinion the time proposed as an alternative to the present conditions, viz., between 10 and 11 a.m. on Sunday mornings, is quite inadequate for the reasons of being too early, on the one hand, and that it would be impossible, on the other hand, for a great many ladies, who, after all, constitute the majority of the congregation, to attend Divine Service at all.

In the interest of all concerned, may I, therefore, be permitted to put forward the following suggestion for the benevolent consideration of the Consistoire:—

Would it not be possible in future to arrange for a change of pulpit once every month, i.e., to hold Divine Service in German at 11 a.m. and in French at 6.30 p.m., say, on the last Sunday of every month?

I am writing on behalf of a good many members of the congregation, who are in agreement with me, and I request all those who share my opinion to state this clearly on their voting paper. -g-

SWISS BANK FOOTBALL CLUB.

SWISS BANK 1st XL (1) v. LUDGATE CIRCUS (4).
This match at Preston Road was fast and strenuous and involved any amount of whistling by the referee. It also saw the exit of the Swiss from the Cup.

There was plenty of vigour and dash shown by the Swiss, which provided its exciting moments and some noteworthy individual performances, but little of that dove-tailed team work that is the basis of good football.

Ludgate Circus fully deserved their victory, though the Swiss were never outplayed to the extent suggested by the score, and the former won so decisively because they took the fullest advantage of their opportunities.

Way, playing in goal, brought off several brilliant saves, but appeared at fault over the first goal scored. Hablutzel, known to all and sundry as the "Baby," played a good game; his strength of kicking was much admired and envied. Schwendener was the best half-back, and Holton and Quaipe the pick of the forwards. Sympathy is extended to the "Doctor" for the injury received.

SWISS BANK 2nd XI (2)
v. CANADIAN PACIFIC RAILWAY (4).

The Swiss Bank 2nd XI were away, opposed to the Canadian Pacific Railway, to whom they lost by 4 goals to 2.

They were playing an up-hill game all the time. Commencing with only ten men, they more or less held their own, but after having their goalie injured, and another player being obliged to leave early, the task was too much for them, with the above result.

SWISS BANK (2) v. BELLMOUNT H.C. (0).

The Swiss Bank Hockey section are to be complimented on their Saturday's success, by beating Bellmount Hockey Club 2 goals to nil.

Such players as the Misses Curths and Messrs. Cassel and Avery are to be congratulated on the way they have got the team together. At the commencement of the season there was a scarcity of players, but by dint of hard practice quite a formidable team has been got together.

A general all-round improvement was shown as against their previous week's play, their combination and passing being much better, and with better shooting their score would have been much heavier.

They certainly have registered the first win of any kind for the Bank this season, and I hope the "Soccer" section will read, mark and inwardly digest and follow this very good example.

SWISS BANK 1st XI (4) v. LLOYDS 2nd XI (1).

(L.B.F.A. Senior "B" Division.)

The very excellent example set by the Hockey section has been followed by the "Soccer" section, and on Saturday, Oct. 27, much to the delight of their supporters, the Swiss Bank gained a well-earned victory over their opponents, Lloyds 2nd XI, by the score of 4-1. This success was thoroughly deserved, as the Swiss did three-fourths of the attacking. Way won the toss, and the Swiss had the assistance of a very strong wind. Despite the heavy going the game was played at a great pace. Quaille and Steiner proved a very effective right wing, and the former had very bad luck in not scoring in the opening stages. Hablutzel, playing at centre, did apparently not feel quite at home in this new position of his; however, better luck next time. After 20 minutes' play, having had things much their own way, the Swiss opened the scoring. Following a fine movement, in which all the forward line took part, Quaipe put in a stinging drive which had the goalkeeper beaten. After that Lloyds got a move on, their left winger running through, and, after drawing Hochuli, scored an open goal. Following this reverse the Swiss forwards again pressed and gained the lead again by a fine shot from Hillebrand, which was deflected past the goalkeeper by one of the opposing backs. The interval came with no further alteration to the score, the Swiss holding the lead by 2 goals to 1.

On resumption, the Swiss maintained their speed, and they very quickly added another goal to their score, Schwendener proving successful from a well-placed centre by the "Doc." From the kick-off again the game was carried into Lloyds half, and a smart move on Schwendener's part, fastening on a forward pass made by Steiner and running through, scored the Swiss' fourth goal. The Swiss from now onwards showed signs of slackening down, and Lloyds commenced some hustle, but without avail, against the sturdy defence of Hochuli, Herzog and Hablutzel, who were dead safe every time, and no further scores resulted.

For the Swiss, it would be unfair to comment on the brilliance of any one player, and from their general play it looked as if they have found their feet at last, and I trust there will be no looking back, but a steady move upwards in their position in the League.

Next Saturday they are away to Glyn's—and the best of luck to them!
