Federal

The Federal Council has appointed Dr. Alfred Escher to the post of Swiss Minister in Iran.

Minister Escher was born in Zurich in 1906, where he received his schooling, he studied law at the Universities of Zurich, Kiel and Berlin. Dr. Escher entered the diplomatic service in 1931 and occupied various posts in Bangkok, Warsaw, Berlin, Ankara, Bagdad, Athen and London. In 1945, whilst in London, he was promoted to the rank of Counsellor of Legation and three years later (1948) he was entrusted by the International Red Cross with several missions in connection with help for refugees.

Monsieur Otto Seifert has been nominated Swiss Minister to Israeli.

The new Minister was born in Wartau (Ct. St. Gall) in 1902. After having occupied posts in industrial concerns in Spain and Italy he entered in 1934 into the service of the Political Department (Foreign Office). He was attached successively to the Swiss Legations in Rome, Madrid and Budapest. In 1948, M. Seifert was promoted to the rank of Counsellor of Legation and transferred to the Legation in Vienna.

The Federal Council has appointed Dr. Paul Ritter, until recently Consul General in Tel Aviv to the post of Consul General in Florence.

Dr. Ritter was born in 1898 in Yokohama. He studied law at the Universities of Geneva, Berne and Leipzig. In 1920, he entered into the service of the Federal Political Department (Swiss Foreign Office). He was in turn attached to the Swiss Legations in London, Vienna, Bucharest, Berlin, Rome, Brussels and Warsaw. In 1939, he was appointed Consul

The Swiss Federal Railways carried in May, 1951, 16.73 million passengers, or 1.32 million more than in May, 1950. The receipts from passenger service amounted to 24.18 million francs. (May, 1950: 22.28 million frs.)

Goods traffic in May has increased by 371,000 tons, and is returned as 1.75 million tons, receipts for which totalled 31.90 million francs (1950: 28.23 million frs.).

Dr. Paul Hauser (Winterthur), has been elected President of the Board of the "Kantonalbank" Zurich, and Mr. A. Meier (Birmensdorf), Vice-President. [A.T.S.]

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
The following deaths are reported from Switzerland:—

Carl Vogler, until 1945, Director of the "Konservatorium" Zurich, in Zurich, at the age of 77. The deceased was for many years President and later honorary President of the "Schweizerischen Tonkünstler Vereins."

Joseph Fritsch, for many years Professor at the "Technikum" Winterthur, in Winterthur, aged 74.

Arthur Balzer-Poltera, a teacher at the "Oberschule" in Alvanen, and for a great number of years President of the commune of Alvanen and a member of the Grand Council of the canton of Grisons, in Alvanen, at the age of 75.

Karl Steinle, President of the "Liga Einkaufs-und Rabattvereinigung" Basle, in Basle, aged 69.



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
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Paul Golay, Editor of the paper "Le Peuple" in Lausanne, at the age of 74. The deceased was a member of the Grand Council of the canton of Vaud, and sat in Parliament (National Council) from 1925-1942.

Pasteur Charles Durand-Pallet, from 1902-1908, Pasteur at the "Eglise libre" in Geneva, and afterwards Professor of theology at the University of Geneva. From 1923-1924, the deceased was Pasteur at the "Französischen Kirche" in Basle. He died in Geneva at the age of 75.

Dr. Theodor Gabriel, from 1911-1949, a member of the government of the canton of Nidwalden and from 1932-1935 a member of the National Council, in Stans, aged 77.

Dr. Em. Plattner, veterinary surgeon in Basle, at the age of 77.

The undermentioned birthday anniversaries are reported from Switzerland:—

M. Edouard von Steiger (70), President of the Swiss Confederation.

M. Von Steiger was born on July 2nd, 1881, in Langnau, and belongs to an old Bernese patrician family. He studied juris prudence at the Universities of Geneva, Leipzig and Berne. On the conclusion of his studies he practised as a lawyer in Langnau and afterwards in Berne. In 1914, he entered the Grand Council of the canton of Berne over which he presided in 1939. In the same year, he was elected a member of the government of the canton of Berne, and in the following year (Dec. 10th, 1940) he entered the Federal Government in succession to Federal-Councillor R. Minger, as chief of the Federal Department of Justice. He belongs to the Radical Party and was President of the Swiss Confederation in 1945.

Adolf Rochedieu (90), Hotelier, in Montreux and Schaffhausen, and from 1911-1948, Secretary of the "Hoteliervereins" of the town of Lucerne.

Otto Coninx (80), President and member of the Board of the "Tages-Anzeiger für Stadt und Kanton Zürich, A.G."

Paul Ringier (75), head of the Publishing firm Ringier & Co., A.G., Zofingen.

Professor, Dr. Paul Schläpfer (70), Professor of chemistry at the Federal Institute of Technology (ETH) Zurich.

Mlle. Marie Hirzel (70), President of the "Zürcher Frauenvereins für alkoholfreie Wirtschaften".

Dr. Carl Betschinger (70), for 40 years administrator of the "Gutsbetriebes Maggi" in Kemptal, a member of the "Kantonsrat" Zurich, and the National Council. In the army, he reached the rank of Colonel of Cavalry. The Federal Institute of Technology, Zurich, has bestowed on him the title of *doctor honoris causa*.

Hermann Niederer (70), Editor of the "Ostschweizerischen Tagblatt" Rorschach.

Dr. Erhard Granger (70), formerly Manager of the "Rhätischen Bahnen" and "Landammann" of Davos.

A syndicate of leading Swiss banks announces the first public offering in Switzerland of bonds of the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development. The banks will offer 50,000,000 Swiss francs of 3½ per cent. 12-year bonds, due August 1st, 1963, at par.

The issue will be known as the 3½ per cent. Swiss Franc Bonds of 1951 and will be open to subscription from July 3rd to July 9th. The bonds are callable at par on or after August 1st, 1950. They will be listed on the Stock Exchanges of Basle, Zurich, Geneva, and Berne.

45,000 sportsmen and women will be taking an active part in Switzerland's 63rd Federal Athletic Festival, which is being held at Lausanne, on the Lake of Geneva, on July 7th-8th and 13th-16th. The first took place at Aarau in 1832. The last, held at Berne, attracted 20,000 participants. This month's will be the greatest of them all. Thirty thousand will be taking part and a further 15,000 in the women's events.

Thirty thousand athletes will contribute to the famous "general exercises", which consist of numerous demonstrations and relay races, to be held at La Blécherette on Monday, July 16th, at 10 o'clock.

In the new permanent hall of the Comptoir Suisse on July 7th and 16th, at 20.30, will be held a big folklore spectacle with a cast of 800. Called "Terres du Rhône" (Land of the Rhône), it has been written by the Swiss author C. F. Landry, with music by Hans Haug. Athletic clubs and musicians and singers from Lausanne will be taking part.

When His Excellency Francisco de Asis Cambo, who was Minister under King Alphonso XIII, went to live in the Canton of Vaud, in 1938, he took with him a large part of his collection of paintings, considered to be one of the most handsome and important private collections in the world. In 1941, he left for the Argentine, but he left his artistic treasures in the hands of the cantonal authorities, who undertook to keep them in perfect condition, and the Cantonal Fine Arts Museum reserved a specially adapted strong-

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room for the collection. The Ambassador died in April, 1947, bequeathing the entire collection to the town of Barcelona.

Recently a delegation from Barcelona, accompanied by the director of the town's art galleries and museums, visited Lausanne to take possession of the paintings. In recognition of the assistance received from the Canton of Vaud, and in memory of the happy time spent in Switzerland by His Excellency Francisco de Cambo, they made a presentation to the Cantonal Fine Arts Museum of a particularly fine and precious painting, "The Birth of the Virgin" (1330-1340) by the Amico di Giotto. Now, after ten years in Lausanne, the Cambo collection has returned to Spain, but the town's museum is all the richer by a magnificent piece of work which will arouse the admiration of all its visitors.

A new route in the centre of the Grisons, Switzerland's canton of 150 valleys, has been chosen for this year's classic mountain race organised by the Grisons section of the Swiss Automobile Club. On August 25th and 26th, the race will be held on the road linking Tiefencastel with Lantsch and Lenzerheide — a magnificent course where spectators can watch the tests in comfort.

Grindelwald has opened a new riding school with a dozen horses and a staff of experienced instructors. Rides are planned to Bachalpsee (7,500 feet above sea level), crossing the Great Scheidegg (6,500 feet) to Meiringen, through the delightful valley of Rosenlauri and returning along the shores of the Lake of Brienz, through Iseltwald-Boenigen and Zweilütschinen. An interesting booklet about the school, printed in English, can be obtained free of charge from the Grindelwald Tourist Office.

The Lake of Arnon (Arnensee), lying in a picturesque valley more than 5,000 ft. above the sea, has recently been stocked with 30,000 trout by the authorities in nearby Gstaad, who reserve the lake's fishing rights to the visitors of their resort. The lake, which is in the extreme south-west of the Canton of Berne near the Vaud frontier, can be reached comfortably by the Col du Pillon road from Aigle to Gstaad.

At the Congress Building in Zurich, the 1st International Congress of Allergists will take place from

the 23rd to the 29th of September, 1951. Delegates sent by 78 governments will debate various questions relating to the treatment of allergic diseases, such as hay-fever, bronchial asthma, goitre and diabetes.

THE FOUNTAINS OF BERNE.

That pleasing feature, the public fountain, is nowhere in Europe in more abundant evidence than in the towns and villages of Switzerland. Many of them are exquisite artistic creations and their style ranges from the Gothic to Renaissance, from Baroque to just utilitarian.

Perhaps the most perfect of such artistic fountains are found in Berne where they are remarkable for both their number and their admirable setting. The wide streets and squares in which they are placed form a background from which they stand out in all their beauty. Not only are they admirable expressions of their builders' art, they also represent something of the town's cultural history, notably the influence of the Renaissance period. To this period belong the "Schützenbrunnen" (1527); the *Seilerbrunnen* (Käfigturm 1549); the *Ryfflibrunnen* (1540-50); the *Dudelsackspfeifer* (1507); the *Zähringerbrunnen* (1542); the *Samsonbrunnen* (1544); and many others, all creations of the 16th century. One of the most charming of these is the quaint *Kindlifresser*, built between 1540 and 1550, picturing the ogre with a collection of babies in his bag and a procession of bears around its column.

Classical fountains of the eighteenth century are also to be found but they are quite eclipsed by the older erections we have enumerated.

The fountains, of course, are not the only attractions offered to the visitor to Berne. The town itself, founded in the 12th century by the Dukes of Zähringen, is of great historical interest. Its ground plan is much the same as it was hundreds of years ago and its arcades give it a distinctive character and peculiar charm.

For the benefit of the tourist, the *Verkehrsverein der Stadt Bern* has published an illustrated folder and map with notes in four languages, one in English. Anyone visiting Berne will be well advised to obtain a copy, he will find it useful and instructive. To quote from the English version: "the fountains ... will tell you their own stories. Go and see them, look and listen!"
