Berne in ten languages

The City of Berne Tourist Office has published a new 10-language brochure for foreign visitors to Switzerland's federal capital.

The new multi-coloured brochure, entitled "Switzerland — that's Berne", contains 16 pages, 140 photographs and is published in German, French, Italian, English, Portuguese, Dutch, Swedish, Japanese and Hebrew. It is being distributed worldwide through the offices

of the Swiss National Tourist Office, Swissair, and Swiss diplomatic missions.

The brochure highlights Berne's ideal location in the heart of Switzerland — and Europe — and its outstanding attractions and amenities for visitors, whatever their interests.

The cover page of the brochure shows one of the city's most famous streets, the Kramgasse, bustling with lifelike bears — the legendary animal of Berne.

TELEPHONES — SWITZERLAND THIRD BEST EQUIPPED COUNTRY IN THE WORLD

At the beginning of 1976 Switzerland, which had 61.09 telephones per 100 inhabitants, came third in the statistics for countries with the highest telephone density in the world, after the United States of America (69.49) and Sweden (66.07). From the world telephone statistics just published by the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, it appears that, among European towns with over 100,000 inhabitants, Zürich is in second place behind Stockholm (111.0) and also possesses more telephones than inhabitants (100.9). After these two cities come Paris (98.1), Geneva (89.6) and Basle (87.4).
